Program Summary

This 2-hour course explores ethical issues that the social media explosion is causing in the courtroom, from jurors obtaining information on their smart phones to lawyers "friending" judges that they appear before in court. This training uses real world examples to explain the social media impact and to make attorneys aware of RPC issues created by this technology.

Who Should Attend?

This program is intended for all government attorneys, whether they handle administrative, civil or criminal matters.

Who Is the Faculty?

DAG Lori Linskey serves as a Senior Counsel within the NJ Division of Criminal Justice. In this capacity, DAG Linskey provides legal analysis on such issues as the Code of Ethics for County Prosecutors, eyewitness ID procedures, and firearms regulations.
