LEGAL ISSUES IN INVESTIGATING AND PROSECUTING CHILD PORNOGRAPHY CASES

Program Summary

The personal computer, the Internet, high-speed Internet access, and digital cameras and camcorders have given pedophiles the ability to create, distribute and collect child pornography files easier, faster and with more perceived anonymity than ever before. This presentation will shine a light on child pornography and the multi-billion dollar child pornography industry that profits on the abuse of children. This presentation will discuss how technology has forever changed the child pornography industry and how that industry operates. This presentation will also explore possible ways to investigate and apprehend those who create child pornography as well as those who enable the industry by buying, distributing and viewing child pornography. Further this presentation will discuss New Jersey's new child pornography statute and how it will enable prosecutors to more effectively prosecute child pornography defendants.

Who Is the Faculty?

DAG Sharpe has supervised hundreds of child pornography investigations including manufacturing, distribution and possession cases. DAG Sharpe has won formal recognition for his exceptional work from FBI Director Robert Mueller, New Jersey State Police Superintendent Rick Fuentes, and New Jersey Attorney General Paula T. Dow. DAG Sharpe has delivered training presentations for prosecutors and investigators in New Jersey on many topics related to child exploitation and hacking investigations and prosecutions. DAG Sharpe is a subject matter expert in the use of legal process to obtain electronic evidence.
