Program Summary

The National Integrated Ballistics Information Network, or NIBIN, is a powerful tool that can identify links between incidents of gun violence that may not have previously been known, providing law enforcement with valuable tip and lead information. This technology is available through the New Jersey State Police Ballistics Unit and understanding it can assist chief executives, policy makers, prosecutors, and case detectives' efforts in reducing violent gun crime in New Jersey.

Each one day course will be divided into two, stand alone, parts. The morning session, aimed at chief law enforcement executives, prosecutors, policy makers, and practitioners, will provide a basic understanding of NIBIN technology and its role as a powerful tool in violent crime reduction efforts. The second session aimed at mid-level managers and practitioners will provide an understanding of the people, processes and technology that are needed to establish a sustainable crime gun processing protocol in their region. **(Please see attached pages for further detail of each Part).**

The Benefits of Understanding NIBIN:

- IBIS/NIBIN makes it possible to share intelligence across jurisdictional boundaries which enables State and local law enforcement agencies to work together to prevent violent crimes.
- The NIBIN Program automates ballistics evaluations and provides actionable investigative leads in a timely manner. NIBIN is the only interstate automated ballistic imaging network in operation in the United States and is available to most major population centers. Prior to the NIBIN Program, firearms examiners performed this process manually which was extremely labor intensive.
- NIBIN affords the ability to link a crime gun possessor to other previously unlinked violent firearms crimes where there may not have been a suspect identified.
- NIBIN can match previously unlinked violent firearm crimes.
- The use of NIBIN can reduce the number of unsolved firearms cases.
- NIBIN can increase interagency communication.
- The use of NIBIN can also assist in developing new leads in “cold cases”.

Who Should Attend?

This program is open to all government attorneys, law enforcement personnel and others who want a basic overview of what is needed to establish a crime gun processing protocol. You can register for just the morning session for the basic overview or for the morning and the afternoon session for a further understanding of the process. **If you wish to attend both sessions, please make sure you register for each session individually.**

Who Is the Faculty?

Pete Gagliardi is the Senior Vice President at Forensic Technology Inc. He has over 45 years of experience extracting useful investigative information from crime guns and related evidence in both the public and private sectors. Thirty of those years were in law enforcement - most of which was focused on the investigation of firearms and explosives related crimes with the United States Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (ATF).

In 1999, Pete retired from ATF as the Special Agent in Charge of the New York Field Division and went to work in the private ballistics technology sector. During his tenure in New York, he was responsible for managing all of ATF’s law enforcement and regulatory operations within the New York /New Jersey metropolitan area.

Pete also held other senior executive positions while assigned to ATF headquarters in Washington, DC. He has served as the agency's principal liaison to Congress, the Deputy Assistant Director of Science and Technology, the Deputy Assistant Director of Law Enforcement Programs, and the Chief of Strategic Planning.

As a result of this experience, Pete has acquired and demonstrated a keen sense of awareness of the important factors to be considered in the design of effective violence reduction programs that provide substantial and sustainable benefits for the cop on the street – the policy maker – and the public at large. Many of the programs and solutions that Pete was instrumental in developing continue to receive national and international recognition.

In 2010, Pete authored a book entitled: *The 13 Critical Tasks: An Inside-Out Approach to Solving More Gun Crime* which Forensic Technology makes available at no cost to criminal justice agencies and educators.

He currently serves on the Firearms Committee of the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP).

In addition: Attorneys from the Attorney General's Office, members of the New Jersey State Police, individuals from The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms, and local law enforcement will speak as well.

Non-State Employees or State Employees not Connected to the Garden State Network

Click on that and log into your account on our system.
