PENNSYLVANIA BRIDGE THE GAP: ETHICS FOR NEW PENNSYLVANIA ATTORNEYS

Program Summary

The Supreme Court of Pennsylvania requires that newly admitted lawyers complete a Bridge the Gap program prior to their first mandatory CLE deadline. This program provides the information necessary to smooth the transition from law student to attorney. It assists recent law school graduates with practical aspects of the practice of law, which can otherwise be learned through trial and error. This basic program will provide practical insight into the key areas that new lawyers need to know in order to comply with the Rules of Professional Conduct and avoid potential malpractice claims. Moderators will lead a discussion format and answer participants' questions.

Who Should Attend?

This program is intended solely for newly admitted Pennsylvania attorneys who must fulfill their mandatory Pennsylvania Bridge the Gap requirements.

Who Is the Faculty?

AAG Margaret A. Cotoia is the Director of the New Jersey Attorney General's Advocacy Institute. The Advocacy Institute offers a broad array of high quality legal education programs that meet the needs of New Jersey government lawyers. Before working for the SEC, Margaret was a hearing officer and trainer at the New Jersey Department of Labor and a staff attorney and mediator at the Public Employment Relations Commission. Margaret holds a B.S. from Georgetown University in Washington, D.C. and a J.D. from the Penn State University Dickinson School of Law in Carlisle, Pennsylvania where she was an editor of the law review.

DAG Dianne Moratti is the Section Chief of the Corrections and State Police unit within the Division of Law. DAG Moratti is a graduate of Rutgers Law School - Camden. Following a federal clerkship with the Hon. Jerome B. Simandle, U.S.D.J., she worked in private practice for several years before joining the Division of Law. She primarily represents the Department of Corrections in federal civil rights lawsuits filed in both federal and state court.

How Do I Register?

Non-State Employees or State Employees not Connected to the Garden State Network

If you are not a State employee, or are otherwise unable to access the AGAI Course Registration System through the Garden State Network, kindly email the Advocacy Institute at: <u>AdvocacyInstitute@lps.state.nj.us</u> for an authorization code to allow you access to the AGAI Course Registration System through the My New Jersey portal. **Setting up your account through the portal is a two-step process, the details of which are set forth in the next two paragraphs.**

Once you receive the portal authorization code you will be prompted to go to the My New Jersey portal at <u>http://www.state.nj.us/</u> and create a portal account. Once your portal account is created

you are prompted to enter your authorization code. This is Step 1 of the process, which you need only do once.

If you have already been issued an authorization code in the past you do not need to request another one. You can log into your account on the Garden State Network at http://www.state.nj.us and under the heading NJ L&PS Applications you will see the Attorney General's Advocacy Institute's Registration System. Click on that and log into your account on our system.

Upon setting up your portal account, you need to set up your AGAI Course Registration System account. This is Step 2. To do so, log on to the My New Jersey Portal <u>http://www.state.nj.us/</u>. Upon opening the AGAI Course Registration System home page, you will see the Create Account link in the Login Box. Click on it and create your account, which will include you selecting a new user name and password.
