Program Summary

Come and explore over 80 years of alcoholic beverage control in New Jersey! From the repeal of Prohibition and the enactment of Title 33, this presentation by the Division of Alcoholic Beverage Control will provide an overview of ABC regulation in New Jersey. The presentation will cover pertinent case law, including narcotics and lewd activity on a licensed premises; how investigations are conducted and administrative versus criminal prosecutions. The presentation will also focus on the administrative enforcement actions of the Division.

Who Is the Faculty?

AAG J. Wesley Geiselman has been with the Division of Alcoholic Beverage Control since 1984. Wes is currently Counsel to the Director. Prior to that position, Wes served as the Division's Chief Prosecutor for 18 years. Wes has been involved in most of the Division's prosecutions and regulatory actions during his 32 year tenure at the ABC. Prior to joining the Division, Wes was the municipal attorney for Freehold Borough. He received his law degree from the University of Louisville School of Law and his Bachelor of Arts Degree in Political Science from Franklin and Marshall College.

DAG Susan Kulik Dolan has been with the Division of Alcoholic Beverage Control since 1997. Susan is currently Assistant Counsel to the Director, responsible for regulatory issues before the ABC. For her first 17 years with the Division, Susan was assigned to the Enforcement Bureau, where she litigated cases involving violations of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Act before the Director and the Office of Administrative Law. Prior to joining the Division, she was an Assistant Prosecutor in Bergen County for nine years. Susan earned her J.D. from Seton Hall University School of Law and received her A.B. in Political Science from Manhattanville College.

Chief Investigator Kevin T. Barber has been with the Division of Alcoholic Beverage Control since 1995 and currently serves as the head of the Investigations Bureau. He plans and coordinates investigations and supervises a staff of investigators who investigate and inspect prospective and current holders of retail and wholesale liquor licenses. Kevin previously served as an investigator for the Division, conducting retail compliance inspections and participating in undercover operations for underage drinking. He also assisted with the Division's training seminars for license holders, their employees, and members of law enforcement. Kevin holds a B.A. in Law and Justice from Rowan University and has also completed Levels I, II and III of the New Jersey Certified Public Manager Program.

Non-State Employees or State Employees not Connected to the Garden State Network

If you are not a State employee, or are otherwise unable to access the AGAI Course Registration System through the Garden State Network, kindly email the Advocacy Institute at: AdvocacyInstitute@lps.state.nj.us for an authorization code to allow you access to the AGAI Course Registration System through the My New Jersey portal. **Setting up your account through the portal is a two-step process, the details of which are set forth in the next two paragraphs.**

Once you receive the portal authorization code you will be prompted to go to the My New Jersey portal at <http://www.state.nj.us/> and create a portal account. Once your portal account is created you are prompted to enter your authorization code. This is Step 1 of the process, which you need only do once.

If you have already been issued an authorization code in the past you do not need to request another one. You can log into your account on the Garden State Network at <http://www.state.nj.us> and under the heading NJ L&PS Applications you will see the Attorney General's Advocacy Institute's Registration System. Click on that and log into your account on our system.

Upon setting up your portal account, you need to set up your AGAI Course Registration System account. This is Step 2. To do so, log on to the My New Jersey Portal <http://www.state.nj.us/>.
