Program Summary

As society continues to rapidly evolve in today's electronic age, responding to public record requests has become increasingly complex and frequently presents novel issues. This program will provide a broad overview of recent OPRA case law developments and offer practical suggestions to better assist with counselling client agencies. It will offer a common sense approach to striking an appropriate balance between transparency and the legitimate need for confidentiality to foster the efficient operation of government and to protect the security and privacy interests of our citizens.

Raymond R. Chance, III is the AAG in charge of the Division of Law's Public Records Advice and Disputes Practice Group. Non-State Employees or State Employees not Connected to the Garden State Network

If you are not a State employee, or are otherwise unable to access the AGAI Course Registration System through the Garden State Network, kindly email the Advocacy Institute at: njagai@njoag.gov for an authorization code to allow you access to the AGAI Course Registration System through the My New Jersey portal. Setting up your account through the portal is a

two-step process, the details of which are set forth in the next two paragraphs.

Once you receive the portal authorization code you will be prompted to go to the My New Jersey portal at http://www.state.nj.us/ and create a portal account. Once your portal account is created you are prompted to enter your authorization code. This is Step 1 of the process, which you need only do once.

If you have already been issued an authorization code in the past you do not need to request another one. You can log into your account on the Garden State Network at http://www.state.nj.us and under the heading NJ L&PS Applications you will see the Attorney General's Advocacy Institute's Registration System. Click on that and log into your account on our system.

Upon setting up your portal account, you need to set up your AGAI Course Registration System account. This is Step 2. To do so, log on to the My New Jersey Portal http://www.state.nj.us/. Upon opening the AGAI Course Registration System home page, you will see the Create Account link in the Login Box.
