Program Summary

Responding to public records requests has become even more complex in the age of COVID-19. The move to telework presents new and novel issues for OPRA custodians. This program will provide a broad overview of OPRA case law developments and offer practical suggestions to address telework issues and better assist with counselling client agencies. The presenters will offer a common sense approach to striking an appropriate balance between transparency and the legitimate need for confidentiality to foster efficient government operation and protect citizens' security and privacy interests.

Eligibility

This program is open to attorneys in the Department of Law and Public Safety, county prosecutors' offices and LPS and agency OPRA custodians invited to attend. Registrants will receive the course materials prior to the program date.

Faculty

AAG Raymond R. Chance III is the AAG in charge of the Division of Law's Public Records Advice and Disputes Practice Group. She supervises OPRA advice, litigation, and administrative matters before the Government Records Council for clients throughout the State. She was previously a member of the Division of Law's Community Affairs, State, & Elections Section, where she represented client agencies, including the Council on Affordable Housing, the State Planning Commission, the Racing Commission, the Civil Service Commission, and the Department of Community Affairs in administrative matters and litigation. She started with the DOL as a deputy in the Transportation Construction & Condemnation Section, where she handled construction litigation. Prior to joining the DOL, DAG DiPippo served as a law clerk for the Honorable Philip S. Carchman, P.J.A.D. (retired on recall to Law Division) and in the Chancery Division, General Equity Part, for the Honorable Mary C. Jacobson and the Honorable Paul Innes, P.J.Ch. She received a B.A. from Wesleyan University and J.D. from Brooklyn Law School.
