Program Summary

This workshop is designed for prosecutors and senior level law enforcement personnel who develop and implement strategies to prevent, reduce, and prosecute gun violence cases. The workshop consists of three components. The first component will provide insight into understanding the shooting environment. The second component will instruct prosecutors on how to use the National Integrated Ballistic Information Network (NIBIN) in their prosecutions to maximize the public-safety impact of gun crime prosecutions. In the final component, attendees will participate in an exercise that simulates the life cycle of the investigation and prosecution of a shooting incident involving NIBIN and other local information sets.

Eligibility

This program is open to Division of Criminal Justice Deputy Attorneys General, Assistant Prosecutors, Assistant United States Attorneys and investigators and law enforcement officers from their respective offices and other law enforcement officers who have been invited to attend. Registrants will receive the course materials on the day of the program.

Faculty

Robert C. Troyer, Esq. served as Colorado's United States Attorney from 2016 to 2018. He was previously the First Assistant U.S. Attorney and a line criminal prosecutor in that office's drug and violent crime units. Mr. Troyer received the PSN Outstanding Contribution Award from the U.S. Attorney General for helping develop and deploy an innovative, forensic-intelligence violent crime prevention strategy in Colorado. He also served as a member of the National Crime Gun Intelligence Governing Board. Mr. Troyer has trained law enforcement officers, prosecutors, community leaders, and public officials on the use of forensic intelligence to prevent gun violence. Mr. Troyer was also in private practice, conducting internal investigations and litigating civil cases. Before attending law school, he taught high school English and worked during the summers as a commercial fisherman in Alaska. He holds a B.A. in English from Pomona College and a J.D. from Boston College Law School, where he was an editor of the law review.

Ray Guidetti was a Lt. Colonel and Deputy Superintendent of the New Jersey State Police. He led the NJSP Investigations Branch of over 600 detectives, analysts, technicians, and scientists assigned to a myriad of different units and mission areas. He is a strong advocate for strategic planning, intelligence, and information sharing, serving on several task forces. While assigned to the Federal Bureau of Investigation's Joint Terrorism Task Force following the September 11, 2001 attacks, he was selected by the U.S. Department of Justice to play a critical role in the prosecution of the 9/11 conspirator Zacharias Moussaoui, known as the PENTTBOMB investigation. Mr. Guidetti received the 2006 U.S. Attorney General's Award for Excellence in Furthering National Security and the 2006 NJSP Trooper of the Year Award. After his retirement from the NJSP, Mr. Guidetti established a resiliency program for Bergen County, New Jersey government employees. He also supported violent crime and counter terrorism initiatives with the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms and the FBI. He writes and lectures on violent crime, intelligence, and counter terrorism topics. Mr. Guidetti earned an M.A. in security studies (Homeland Defense and Security) from the Naval Postgraduate School, an M.A. in education from Seton Hall University, and a B.S. from Montclair State University.
