Program Summary

Trial work requires knowledge of the New Jersey Rules of Evidence and the application of the rules. This presentation will help you enhance your trial skills with the evidence rules you need to know for your next criminal trial, including tips on pretrial motions in limine, navigating hearsay and handling trial testimony.

Eligibility

This course is designed for Division of Criminal Justice Deputy Attorneys General and County Prosecutors and Assistant Prosecutors. However, other Department of Law and Public Safety DAsG and AAsG are eligible to attend. Registrants will receive the course materials prior to the program date.

Faculty

DAG Cassandra Montalto is the Deputy Chief of the Gangs and Organized Crime Bureau of the Division of Criminal Justice. She has prosecuted and tried cases involving racketeering, the distribution of controlled dangerous substances, weapons offenses, human trafficking, and the smuggling of contraband into correctional facilities. She has also prosecuted cases involving large scale wiretap investigations focused on interstate weapons trafficking and violent crime. DAG Heather Hausleben serves in the Gangs and Organized Crimes Bureau of the Division of Criminal Justice. The Bureau handles cases involving racketeering, distribution of controlled dangerous substances, weapons offenses, and human trafficking. DAG Hausleben also serves in the Office of Public Integrity and Accountability's Integrity Bureau handling cases involving police use of force and deaths in custody. She served as a law clerk for Camden County Superior Court Judge Samuel Natal. DAG Hausleben is a graduate of the University of South Florida and holds a J.D. from Seton Hall Law School.
