Program Summary

This program will focus on how to present an effective closing argument that leaves a lasting impression. The presenter will help students develop a closing that integrates the legal, factual and persuasive elements of their case theory, captures the jury's attention, summarizes the testimony and evidence and persuades the jury to find in favor of their side.

Eligibility

This program is mandatory for new assistant prosecutors and Division of Criminal Justice deputies hired after October 2021 who have been selected to attend by each county prosecutor's office and the Division of Criminal Justice. Other assistant prosecutors and deputy and assistant attorneys general in the Divisions of Criminal Justice and Law are also welcome to register. Registrants will receive the course materials prior to the program date.

Faculty

AAG Erik Daab is the Deputy Director of the Division of Criminal Justice, overseeing complex criminal litigation and the Specialized Crimes Bureau. He previously served as Chief of the Specialized Crimes Bureau, which prosecutes multi-jurisdictional criminal cases, as well as cases referred by State agencies including the Division of Gaming Enforcement. Prior to that, he served as Deputy Chief of the Gangs and Organized Crime Bureau, prosecuting large-scale narcotics and weapons trafficking cases. He also served as Chief of the Medicaid Fraud Control Unit, and in the Appellate and Corruption Bureaus. AAG Daab started his career prosecuting death penalty cases for the Tennessee Office of the Attorney General and was the State Witness for the execution of the first inmate executed in Tennessee in forty years. He is a graduate of Seton Hall School Law School.
