### *Program Summary*

This course will provide a brief overview of the most significant criminal appeals likely to be argued in the New Jersey Supreme Court during the 2023-2024 Court Term.

### *Eligibility*

This program is designed for attorneys in the Division of Criminal Justice and county prosecutors' offices. However, it is open to all deputy and assistant attorneys general in the Department of Law and Public Safety. Registrants will receive the course materials prior to the program date.

### *Faculty*

**DAG William Cooper-Daub** serves in the Division of Criminal Justice's Appellate Unit, where he litigates criminal appeals before the Appellate Division and New Jersey Supreme Court and habeas corpus proceedings before the United States District Court and United States Court of Appeals. He is a member of the Unit's working teams on corruption, organized crime and electronic surveillance, habeas and federal courts, Second Amendment issues, and search and seizure. Before joining the Division, he worked as a staff clerk for the Prisoner Litigation Office of the United States District Court for the District of New Jersey, served as a law clerk to the Honorable Leda Dunn Wettre, U.S.M.J., and was a court attorney for the Law Division of the New York Supreme Court, Kings County, Civil Term. He received a B.F.A. with honors from Carnegie Mellon University and a J.D., magna cum laude, from Fordham University School of Law.

**DAG David Galemba** serves in the Division of Criminal Justice's Appellate Unit, where he litigates criminal appeals before the Appellate Division, Supreme Court of New Jersey, and the United States District Court. He is a member of the Unit's working teams on Sentencing/Sex Offenders, Trial Issues/Evidence, Criminal Justice Reform, Second Amendment, and Cyber Issues. Prior to joining the Division, DAG Galemba served for over fourteen years as an assistant prosecutor in the appellate units of the Cumberland and Salem County Prosecutor's Offices. He received his B.A. from Washington University in St. Louis and his J.D. from Rutgers School of Law-Camden, where he was an editor on the Journal of Law and Religion
