Program Summary

This presentation will cover a range of topics that all prosecuting attorneys should master to ensure the best possible result in a pretrial detention appeal. The presenter will discuss the decision whether to appeal, documents required to perfect appeals, requests for stays, motions for reconsideration, responding to checklists and briefs, and how to write pretrial detention appeals if DCJ is the appellant.

Eligibility

This program is mandatory for new assistant prosecutors and Division of Criminal Justice deputies hired after October 2022 who have been selected to attend by each county prosecutor's office and the Division of Criminal Justice. Other assistant prosecutors and Division of Criminal Justice deputies are welcome to register.

Faculty

DAG Sarah Hunt is a Special Assistant to the Director of the Division of Criminal Justice, working on policy and special projects for DCJ. She began her career with DCJ in the Appellate Bureau, where she litigated criminal appeals in the Appellate Division and Supreme Court and was a member of the Bureau's working groups on Pretrial Detention/Speedy Trial, Evidence, DWI/Municipal Court, and Wiretaps. She has received Attorney General's Awards for Excellence in Trial Litigation for her work on State v. Olenowski, and for Outstanding Contribution to a Special Project for her work on Criminal Justice Reform, and a DCJ Director's Award for Excellence in Appellate Litigation. Prior to joining DCJ, DAG Hunt clerked in the Appellate Division for the Honorable Garry S. Rothstadt, J.A.D. She received a B.A. from Bates College and a J.D. from Rutgers School of Law - Newark, where she was a Managing Notes Editor of the

Rutgers Law Review, a Marsha Wenk Public Interest Law Fellow, and a Proskauer Rose Fellow.
