Program Summary

In <u>State v. Nyema</u>, 249 <u>N.J.</u> 509 (2022), the Supreme Court addressed the requirement of specific and articulable facts, taken together with rational inferences, that give rise to reasonable suspicion of criminal activity to justify an investigative stop. This program will examine the Nyema holding in detail, particularly as it relates to the specificity of the information required and the types of considerations that may not be used to support reasonable suspicion. The instructors will discuss the surrounding case law in relation to motion practice that challenges the validity of investigative stops and the evidence resulting from those stops.

Eligibility

Registration for this program is limited to Cumberland County assistant prosecutors.

Faculty

Harold B. Shapiro is the First Assistant Prosecutor for Cumberland County. AP Malone holds a Bachelor's of Science in Pre-Law, with a minor in Criminal Justice from Liberty University and a Juris Doctor from Rutgers Law School, Camden.
