Program Summary

Trial work requires knowledge of the New Jersey Rules of Evidence, the application of the rules and interplay with the Rules of Court. The presentation will help you enhance your trial skills with the evidence rules you need to know for your next civil trial. This program is a continuation of the Evidence course offered in September 2023. Topics will include a comprehensive discussion of hearsay, business records, depositions, admissions and summaries.

Eligibility

Faculty

DAG Timothy O'Brien is an Assistant Section Chief in the Tort Litigation and Judiciary Section of the Division of Law. Prior to serving in this section, DAG O'Brien worked in the State Police, Employment and Corrections Section. There, he defended State Police and the Department of Corrections in claims of excessive force, wrongful arrest, conditions of confinement including the provision of inadequate medical care, as well as ADA violations and employment claims brought against other State agencies in State and Federal court. Prior to joining the Division of Law, DAG O'Brien was a partner at Crammer, Bishop & O'Brien, where he focused on defending medical malpractice claims. DAG O'Brien has tried over 100 jury trials to verdict during the course of his

career. He received a B.A. in Psychology from Stonehill College and a J.D. from the University of Dayton School of Law.

DAG David Burns serves in the Tort Litigation and Judiciary Section of the Division of Law. He defends the State and other public entities in claims of wrongful death and catastrophic injury and prosecutes judicial removal trials before the New Jersey Supreme Court. Prior to joining the Division of Law, he was a partner at Lacovara and Burns, LLC where he represented plaintiffs in personal injury law suits. DAG Burns was a law clerk to the Honorable J. Gilbert Van Sciver, Jr., P.J.S.C., Law Division - Burlington County. He earned a B.S. in Accounting, *summa cum laude*, from Saint Joseph's University and a J.D., *cum laude*, from Rutgers School of Law, Camden.
