Program Summary

Responding to public records requests continues to present a myriad of challenges as courts continue to confront and weigh in on novel and complicated issues and as revisions to the Open Public Records Act take effect on September 3, 2024. This program will provide a broad overview of OPRA case law developments and recent amendments to the Act, as well as offer practical suggestions to assess old and new challenges to better assist with counselling client agencies. The presenters will offer a common sense approach to striking an appropriate balance between transparency and the legitimate need for confidentiality, to foster efficient government operation and protect citizens' security and privacy interests.
