Program Summary

This presentation will cover the Rules of Professional Conduct pertaining to prosecutors' and defense counsel's trial conduct. The presenters will also discuss pertinent RPCs and case law.

Eligibility

This program is mandatory for new assistant prosecutors and Division of Criminal Justice deputies hired after October 2023 who have been selected to attend by each county prosecutor's office and the Division of Criminal Justice. Other assistant prosecutors and Division of Criminal Justice deputies are welcome to register.

Faculty

AAG Erik Daab is the Deputy Director of the Division of Criminal Justice. He oversees DCJ's violent crime units and complex criminal litigation. He previously served as Chief of the Specialized Crimes Bureau, prosecuting multi-jurisdictional criminal cases, and cases referred by State agencies including the Division of Gaming Enforcement. Prior to that, he served as Deputy Chief of the Gangs and Organized Crime Bureau, prosecuting large-scale narcotics and weapons trafficking cases. He also served as Chief of the Medicaid Fraud Control Unit, and in the Appellate and Corruption Bureaus. AAG Daab started his career prosecuting death penalty cases for the Tennessee Office of the Attorney General and was the State Witness for the execution of the first inmate executed in Tennessee in forty years. He is a graduate of Seton Hall University School Law School.

DAG Heather Hausleben is a member of the Division of Criminal Justice's Trial Bureau, where she oversees and participates in trials across the Division's bureaus and handles complex cases. She was previously the Deputy Chief of the Office of Public Integrity and Accountability's

Corruption Bureau, where she oversaw the investigation and prosecution of crimes committed by and involving public officials. Before serving in OPIA, DAG Hausleben was assigned to the Gangs and Organized Crimes Bureau of the Division of Criminal Justice, handling cases involving racketeering, distribution of controlled dangerous substances, weapons offenses, and human trafficking. Following her graduation from law school, she served as a law clerk for Camden County Superior Court Judge Samuel Natal. DAG Hausleben holds a Bachelor of Arts in Philosophy from the University of South Florida and a Juris Doctor from Seton Hall Law School.
