Program Summary

The program will offer an overview of court rule-based discovery obligations, Brady/Giglio issues in discovery and the admissibility vs. discoverability of Brady/Giglio materials.

Eligibility

This program is mandatory for new assistant prosecutors and Division of Criminal Justice deputies hired after October 2023 who have been selected to attend by each county prosecutor's office and the Division of Criminal Justice. Other assistant prosecutors and Division of Criminal Justice deputies are welcome to register.

Faculty

DAG Heather Hausleben is a member of the Division of Criminal Justice's Trial Bureau, where she oversees and participates in trials across the Division's bureaus and handles complex cases. She was previously the Deputy Chief of the Office of Public Integrity and Accountability's Corruption Bureau, where she oversaw the investigation and prosecution of crimes committed by and involving public officials. Before serving in OPIA, DAG Hausleben was assigned to the Gangs and Organized Crimes Bureau of the Division of Criminal Justice, handling cases involving racketeering, distribution of controlled dangerous substances, weapons offenses, and human trafficking. Following her graduation from law school, she served as a law clerk for Camden County Superior Court Judge Samuel Natal. DAG Hausleben holds a Bachelor's of Arts in Philosophy from the University of South Florida and a Juris Doctor from Seton Hall Law School.

DAG Danielle Scarduzio serves in the Auto Theft Task Force of the New Jersey Division of Criminal Justice. She has prosecuted cases involving racketeering, financial facilitation, cargo theft, identity fraud, carjacking, bias crimes, computer crimes, labor crimes, and environmental crimes. Prior to joining the Division, she was an Assistant District Attorney with the Ulster County, New York District Attorney's Office. She received a B.A. from Rutgers University and a J.D. from Rutgers School of Law – Camden.
