Shortly after I became Attorney General my office hosted what was believed to be the first-ever statewide law enforcement summit on October 8, 1996. This extraordinary gathering of the law enforcement officers from all levels of government resulted in a major report containing selected issues and priorities still used today as a guidepost for law enforcement activities throughout the state.

My office is now in the planning stages for a second summit to be organized around three major topics. They are: Race and Law Enforcement; Youth Violence and School Safety; and Drug Enforcement.

Race and Law Enforcement. According to recent surveys, citizens who are persons of color do not express the same level of confidence in law enforcement as other citizens. As the chief law enforcement officer of the state, I want all New Jerseyans, regardless of color, to have confidence in law enforcement at all levels. This segment of the summit will feature panelists and other speakers in an effort to engage in a statewide dialogue raising sensitivity and awareness on all sides of the issue.

Youth Violence and School Safety. Recent tragic events in other states teach us that we must be prepared to use all lawful means to keep firearms, other deadly weapons, and illicit drugs out of our schools and away from children. We have already taken an important step by preparing a comprehensive, 273-page school search policy manual intended for use by law enforcement and school officials so that searches are properly conducted to maintain order and discipline in the schools. This segment of the summit will build on our continuing efforts by discussing strategies and professional techniques to better equip communities to address these twin issues of teen violence and school safety.

Drug Enforcement. Governor Whitman used the occasion of the 1996 summit to announce her Drug Enforcement, Education and Awareness Program, which remains the cornerstone of our enforcement efforts. This second summit will provide a general update on this most important public policy issue. We cannot have an intelligent or complete discussion of the criminal justice system without including the subject of drugs because the issue is so pervasive in scope and impact. Our efforts have shown real gains but this is an issue which must remain uppermost in our minds to make lasting improvement.

Our goal is to be in a position to host this all-day gathering in November or December of this year. Invitees would include representatives of all levels of law enforcement -- federal, state, county and municipal -- in addition to other representatives of the executive branch, legislators, civil-rights advocates, education officials and other community leaders. My office will contact you shortly to obtain your comments and suggestions regarding proposed panelists and specific subject points within the three topic areas described above as well as your suggested list of specific invitees.



Subject: Background for Law Enforcement Summit — Summary of National Poll

Findings on Race, Police and the Criminal Justice System

Robin Parker provided me with two national polls that touch in part on the issue of how law enforcement and the criminal justice system are viewed differently by minorities and whites. These polls provide a national context in which to place the Eagleton Poll that found significant differences between the ways whites and minorities viewed the State Police. Here are a few highlights:

1. The Joint Center for Political and Economic Studies National Opinion Poll (Spring 1997).

Regarding "Police Harassment," the poll indicates that:

- ► 81.4 percent of blacks and 82.8 percent of Hispanics agreed that police were much more likely to harass and discriminate against blacks than against whites;
- ► 55.6 percent of whites a majority also believed that police were more likely to discriminate against blacks; and
- ► 69.4 percent of overall respondents from the Northeast indicated they thought police discrimination existed.
- 2. Black/White Relations in the United States, A Gallup Poll Social Audit (June 1997).

Regarding "Who is Perceived as Treated More Harshly by Criminal Justice System — Blacks or Whites."

## Of all respondents, the Gallup poll indicates:

- 47 percent of respondents in the general public said that blacks are treated more harshly by the criminal justice system than whites;
- 43 percent of respondents said blacks and whites are treated both the same: and
- 3 percent of the respondents said whites are treated more harshly than blacks.

Of all black respondents, the poll indicates:

- 72 percent of blacks said that blacks are treated more harshly than whites by the criminal justice system;
- 23 percent of blacks said they are treated both the same; and
- 2 percent of blacks said whites are treated more harshly.

For your information, I am attaching copies of the poll materials. They contain other information that may be of interest on the subject of race relations.

## GOVERNOR WHITMAN'S REMARKS LAW ENFORCEMENT SUMMIT EAST RUTHERFORD FRIDAY, DECEMBER 11, 1998

Thank you for that introduction. Good morning, everyone. I want to welcome you all to the second statewide law enforcement summit.

At today's summit we will hold panel discussions on youth violence and school safety. We will also examine the state's strategies to combat illegal drug use. The majority of this conference, however, will focus on an issue on the minds of both police officers and citizens – race relations in law enforcement.

To effectively address this issue, we must have an open dialogue between those in law enforcement and the communities they serve.

That is why I am so pleased to welcome not only New Jersey law enforcement officers, but also government and community leaders, civil rights activists, and educators to this conference.

Today, we will hear from individuals with experience in confronting these issues. They include Charles Ramsey, the Chief of Police in Washington, D.C., the Reverend Reginald Jackson, of the Black Ministers Council of New Jersey, Ralph Martin, the District Attorney in Boston, Professor George Kelling, of Rutgers University, and Colonel Carl Williams, the Superintendent of the New Jersey State Police.

I know that each of the speakers and panelists will add to the informed discussion of the issues. But I hope that each of you will actively participate in the workshops and share your own ideas and experiences.

We are all here today with the same goal: to raise sensitivity to and awareness of race relations in law enforcement and to take a proactive step to address this issue at the local level.

The minority community has legitimate concerns about the role race plays in law enforcement. One can debate whether that concern stems from reality or perception, or a combination of the two. However, as Governor I believe that even the perception of racism demands our immediate attention.

All citizens of New Jersey have the right to be free from discrimination. And they have the right to be treated fairly and with respect by all members of the criminal justice system.

It is unacceptable for even one person to have reason to question the motives of the agencies that are entrusted with administering justice.

Yet, recent surveys tell us that people of color do not express the same level of confidence in law enforcement as other citizens.

We are here today to change that. We are here to strengthen the partnership between law enforcement and the minority community. And we all know the best way to achieve this is through shared responsibility. That means encouraging the community to be part of the solution, as we make certain law enforcement is not part of the problem.

That is why I am happy to announce that the Department of Law and Public Safety will award grants to establish up to ten pilot programs around the state to support the concept of community justice.

The programs will focus on strengthening collaboration between law enforcement and the communities they serve and improving the quality of life in New Jersey's neighborhoods.

The grants of up to \$100,000 each will be made available to county prosecutors and State Police who will work with community groups, schools, local law enforcement agencies, and the Human Relations Commission to design programs that will improve relations.

These grants are an important step in bringing police chiefs and prosecutors together with mayors, schools, community leaders, and clergy. The programs will be a catalyst for change by helping break down the barriers between citizens and law enforcement agencies.

As we award these grants, there is, of course, another important way we can improve race relations: by bringing more members of minority communities into law enforcement careers.

That means making a commitment to increasing minority representation in our police force. Without diversity it becomes very difficult for any law enforcement community to maintain a level of credibility, respect, and confidence among those they serve.

I am happy to announce that we are launching a comprehensive long-range plan for State Police recruitment, with specific goals for increasing female and minority representation.

As part of this effort, the Division of State Police will expand its Recruitment Bureau to a full-time staff of recruiters who will actively seek candidates.

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As part of this effort, the Division of State Police will expand its Recruitment Bureau to a full-time staff of recruiters who will actively seek candidates.

Again, as I said earlier, this has to be a partnership. To ensure diversity, we must work together. I hope all of you here today – especially community leaders, civil rights advocates, and educators – will assist in these recruitment efforts by making recommendations for potential State Police recruits in your communities.

Let me add that as another step to increase diversity, we intend to make the recruitment process proceed on a more predictable cycle. As you may have read today, we will conduct smaller and more frequent academy classes. In fact, we are committing to accepting two classes of 50 new recruits every year. This will assist our efforts to attract the most qualified candidates.

Increased diversity within the police force will mean a law enforcement community more representative of the people it serves. This is not simply a matter of equity, it is a matter of justice.

But encouraging community involvement and increasing diversity in the ranks is not enough. We must do more to build the public trust in law enforcement procedures.

While I recognize that this will take time to develop, we are already taking steps to open the process.

For instance, earlier this week I fulfilled my commitment to provide State Police patrol cars on the Tumpike with video monitoring equipment.

Already, six out of every ten Turnpike patrol cars have been fitted with video cameras. The remainder will be equipped as the oldest patrol cars are replaced.

The cameras will be used during all traffic and criminal enforcement stops of motor vehicles, police pursuits, fatal motor vehicle accidents, and major crime scenes, and other situations in which the trooper determines that the incident should be recorded.

The in-car cameras will provide straightforward evidence of the law enforcement process -- protecting both officers and the public. The cameras will increase accountability as well as help resolve situations of alleged misconduct. I believe this technology will benefit both our police and the public trust.

I keep talking about the fight against crime as a partnership. I believe it has to be.

While law enforcement agencies play a significant role in preserving public safety, they cannot do this alone. They must act in conjunction with the law-abiding residents of the communities they serve.

Law enforcement isn't something that that is done for a community, it is something done hand-in-hand with a community. Policing is most effective when officers and the citizens collaborate.

That means taking a community-based approach to improving race relations. And that is exactly what we hope to encourage here today.

We can create real change if we take the ideas from today's discussion and work together to encourage community involvement in the law enforcement process.

I want to thank you all for your participation in this law enforcement summit, and for giving thoughtful attention to these important issues. Working together, we will improve our ability to protect and serve all of the people of New Jersey.

## Proposed Law Enforcement Summit Outline As of September 10, 1998

Community Justice: Adapting Community Policing Strategies to Address Persistent Criminal Justice Problems

Purpose:

The purpose of this Summit is to discuss three major criminal justice issues — race relations in law enforcement, youth violence, and the drug problem — in the context of a community-based "problem-solving" approach that will require the active contributions of all the constituencies represented at the Summit. The three problems will be discussed in a frank and candid way, identifying the impediments to achieving safe and drug-free communities,. Much of the Summit will be devoted to identifying and highlighting programs and ideas that work, and especially initiatives that allow police departments to gain the respect and trust of minorities. The Summit will bring together leaders from five fields (law enforcement, local government, community groups, schools, and businesses), representing key constituents of local "problemsolving teams." The Summit will initiate an ongoing process of dialogue, adapting proven community policing strategies to address the three aforementioned criminal justice problems. Follow-up will include the awarding of technical assistance grants to establish local community justice programs using surplus Safe and Secure Community funds administered by the Attorney General.

#### Summit Theme:

All citizens of New Jersey, regardless of where they live or how much they earn, have a right to be safe and secure in their homes and communities; a right to be treated fairly, impartially, and with respect by all members of the criminal justice system; a right to have their children attend schools that offer a safe, disciplined environment that is conducive to learning and free of the disruptive influence of fear, violence, weapons, and drugs; and a right to be heard by law enforcement officials and other governmental actors that are responsible for developing and implementing public safety programs.

These fundamental rights can only be achieved by strengthening the collaborative partnership between the law enforcement community and other key community actors than can impact on the quality of life in neighborhoods across the state. These actors, besides traditional law enforcement officials such as police chiefs and prosecutors, include local government officials (majors, town councils, local housing authorities, etc.); community groups (community leaders and activists, clergy, tenant associations); schools; and local business leaders.

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All of these key actors share responsibility for ensuring the safety and security of citizens. These actors must work together to promote multi-disciplinary programs that foster a positive relationship between citizens and law enforcement officers, and must help to identify and showcase innovative programs, policies, and practices that have proven to be successful in preventing and responding decisively to crime.

### Community Justice: A Logical Extension of Community Policing Programs.

## A. The New for a Multi-Disciplinary Perspective.

Law enforcement and prosecuting agencies have a significant role to play in preserving pablic safety, but cannot do it alone and cannot act in isolation from the law-abjective residents of the communities they serve. All of the key actors noted above must come to understand how they can contribute to solving the criminal justice problems facing our society — especially the problems of race relations in law enforcement, youth violence and school safety, and the drug epidemic — problems that are so complex and persistent that they demand a coordinated, multi-faceted response.

### B. Building on the Success of Community Policing Strategies.

During the course of the last decade, many law enforcement agencies throughout New Jersey and the rest of the nation adopted an enforcement strategy known as "community policing." This approach recognizes that police agencies must become integral parts of, not isolated from, the communities and constituents their officers are sworn to protect and serve. Community policing stresses positive interaction between police officers and citizens, establishing a close working relationship and a sense of trust, mutual respect, and confidence. Many experts credit community policing for contributing to the significant decline in violent and property crime rates over the course of the last few years.

Community policing is also known as "problem solving" policing, where specially-trained officers work closely with citizens and community and business leaders to identify local problems and to marshall government and private sector resources to solve those problems that affect safety and security and impact on the quality of life.

Problem-solving policing strategies respond to what some criminologists in recent years have referred to as the "broken window" effect. Small unresolved problems, such as broken windows or streetlights, can have a cumulative and synergistic negative effect, and can lead to larger problems, including civil disorder and crime. This is especially likely to occur where local residents believe that

government is either unable or unwilling to address local problems.

Problem-solving policing can only be accomplished where citizens meet regularly with law enforcement officers, either on an informal basis (the cop on the beat) or by establishing steering committees that provide an opportunity for residents to discuss neighborhood problems with high-ranking law enforcement officials. Pilot demonstration projects, such as the Weed and Seed Program and the Police Community Partnership Program, prove that this approach works and can be replicated in communities across the state using existing resources. Such programs have been able to restore a sense of community, pride, and enhanced respect and confidence in the ability of the law enforcement community to prevent crimes from occurring, and to respond decisively to those crimes that are committed in the target neighborhoods.

C. Applying Problem-Solving Strategies to Broader Criminal Justice Problems

Based on the nationwide success of the basic community policing strategy, it is now time to consider how to expand these problem-solving techniques to address three distinct but closely interrelated issues of special concern to the citizens of New Jersey: race relations in law enforcement, youth violence and school safety, and drug enforcement.

It is important to recognize that we are not writing on a clean state and that much has already been done at the local level. The establishment of county Human Relations Commissions, for example, is a positive step toward identifying and resolving problems on a routine basis. This collaborative approach should be considered in every local jurisdiction.

One way to accomplish this goal would be to establish a statewide network of local problem-solving teams, comprised of high-ranking police officials; county prosecutors; narcotics task force commanders; other local governmental representatives (i.e., mayors and other local elected officials, housing authorities, human resource agencies, etc.); community and religious leaders; tenant associations; schools; local merchants and other representatives from the business community. These teams should stress a collaborative, multi-disciplinary approach that can help to break down the artificial barriers that prevent citizens from communicating directly with law enforcement agencies, thus serving as a catalyst for local community justice initiatives.

The Summit will provide an opportunity to demonstrate the practical benefits of this community-based problem-solving strategy. Examples might include diversity recruitment programs and neighborhood revitalizations projects.

#### D. Key Elements of Community Justice Programs.

There are a number of key components of any effective community justice program, including:

- 1. Communication. Law enforcement and prosecuting agencies must interact closely and routinely with private citizens and other key actors, and must be prepared to listen carefully to their problems, concerns, and expectations. This dialogue is part of an educational process that can help to overcome myths and misconceptions, allowing all of the key actors to understand not only the nature and scope of local public safety problems, but also inventory the resources (governmental and private sector) that are available to address those problems. Just as community policing officers get out of their patrol cars to meet and befriend local residents and merchants, every jurisdiction must establish a process whereby community representatives can meet on a regular, routine basis with high-ranking law enforcement officials to discuss mutual concerns.
- 2. <u>Credibility Through Mutual Respect and Diversity</u>. For law enforcement and prosecuting agencies to be effective, they must earn and maintain the respect and confidence of the general public, and must not be viewed as adversaries of law-abiding citizens. The membership and command structure of law enforcement agencies should fairly represent the diverse communities they serve. Special attention must therefore be focused on minority recruitment and promotion issues. Law enforcement agencies must also earn a reputation for treating all persons fairly and impartially, and for deploying resources in a fair and equitable manner. Systems must be established and enforced to make certain that acts of prejudice or bigotry will not be tolerated and will be promptly detected and remedied.
- 3. <u>Cooperation</u>. An effective community justice strategy must stress the need for multi-disciplinary responses to complex local and societal problems. No one governmental agency can be expected single-handedly to solve such vexing and persistent problems as school violence and drug trafficking. Rather, it is necessary to ensure close cooperation, for example, between schools and police, and also to stress the need for better cooperation and coordination <u>within</u> the law enforcement community through the establishment of formal and informal multi-agency task forces, such as those in the Police Community Partnership Program and the Violent Offender Removal Program.

4. <u>Creativity</u>. The law enforcement community and other key actors must be prepared to tackle modern problems with modern solutions. These evolving criminal justice issues require law enforcement and prosecuting agencies, for example, to adapt their strategies and tactics, taking full advantage of new crime-fighting and crime-prevention technologies, so as to keep pace with the increasingly sophisticated methods of criminal enterprises. Community justice strategies thust also be informed by objective research. Law enforcement and other governmental policymakers must be prepared to replicate those programs that work, and must also be willing to chapte of even abandon traditional programs, policies, or tactics that are dated or otherwise ineffective.

### On police stops based on race

On April 29, I was involved in a racially motivated stop on the New Jersey Turnpike in Ridgefield, just across from the Public Service Electric and Gas plant.

I was pulled over while traveling southbound at 55 mph. After giving the officer my license and registration, I asked why I was pulled over. He did not give a reason, but instead, questioned me for the next 10 minutes. Among the questions asked were where I was going, why I was going there, where I came from, even where I worked.

After the questions, I stated that since he could not give me a reason as to why I was stopped, I had to as-

sume I was stopped because I am a young black male. He then ordered me out of the vehicle and chastised me for my "attitude." He then ordered me back into the car without giving me a citation. Luckily, I was able to make note of his name.

One week later, I wrote the New Jersey State Police to express concern as to the racial aspect of the stop. Two weeks later, I got a letter stating that there would be an inquiry. Three weeks after that, I was interviewed by the police to give my side of the story. I was then informed that they wanted to interview me again and that they wanted me to try and pick the officer out of a photo lineup. Apparently, this was necessary because the officer denied ever having stopped me.

I guess the only way for a black male to be believed in New Jersey is to take a bullet.

At the second interview, nine weeks after the incident, I picked the officer out of a photo lineup. At that point, I felt I had done everything asked of me and that the state police would now be able to take carc of its problem.

I was wrong. Instead, the next day, I got a phone call from the investigator

and was asked if I knew any police officers who worked in New Jersey. When I answered yes, he expressed concern that I was able to pick out the police officer after so long because someone may have shown me his picture.

The absurdity did not stop there. I have also been asked if I knew any black males who were stopped on the turnpike, because if so, then my complaint may be some form of retaliation. I was also told that despite the preponderance of the evidence, my complaint may not be substantiated due to a lack of physical evidence. I guess the only way for a black male to be believed in New Jersey is to take a builted.

Unfortunately, black males will always be subject to these stops until


New Jersey leadership decides to do something about this problem. I have lheard both Governor Whitman and Col. Carl Williams, superintendent of the state police, say that racial-profile stops do not occur in New Jersey. They choose to stick their heads in the sand rather than acknowledge the problem. In essence, they condone the practice.

As for my complaint, after 15 weeks, I have heard nothing from the police on results of their inquiry. This inaction suggests that they are not interested in handling this type of problem. Thus the civil rights of young black males will always be jeopardized when they drive in New Jersey.

SUBJECT: Model Policy Procedures - Motor Vehicle Stops

During our September 23 "brainstorming" session to discuss the agenda for the upcoming Law Enforcement Summit, you indicated that the State Police have developed policies and procedures that help to make certain that motor vehicle stops are conducted lawfully and that help to bolster public confidence that decisions made by State Police officers during the course of a roadside encounter are never based upon impermissible criteria, such as a motorist's race or ethnic origin. It was mentioned during the meeting, for example, that (1) the Division of State Police has promulgated standard operating procedures that require all requests for permission to search to be memorialized in writing (whether or not the motorist or passenger agrees to the search and without regard to whether a consent search yields evidence of crime); (2) that State Police members may not ask for permission to search unless they have a reasonable articulable suspicion to believe that the vehicle or thing to be searched contains contraband or evidence of a crime; (3) and that a trooper is required to provide the dispatcher with a description of the occupants of a stopped vehicle at the earliest stage of a police encounter, thereby providing a reliable record of the race and ethnicity of all temporarily-detained motorists.

I think that the State Police should be commended for having gone beyond the bare minimum requirements imposed by the courts under the State and Federal Constitutions. These kinds of internal procedures and reporting requirements make it possible for supervisors to review patrol logs and reports and quickly identify and remedy

any potential problems (e.g., where it appears that a particular officer has stopped a disproportionate percentage of minority motorists, or where it appears that an officer is more likely to ask minority motorists to consent to a search). I would very much like to review any written materials developed by the State Police with a view toward suggesting to the Attorney General that he consider recommending or possibly even requiring all police departments to adopt similar policies.

I am writing this letter to ask about the result and a few additional questions about an incident on the Garden State Parkway involving the Essex County prosecutor a few weeks ago.

I have read in the newspaper, she was traveling at 85 MPH using her four way flashers. Motorists along the roadway phoned the state police to file complaints about the state car. When she was finally stopped, she had her niece and a friend in the car. She claimed she was on her way to Atlantic City on business. She also claims she was stopped due to racial reasons. This is where my questions start.


- 1. She was issued a ticket for careless driving, but not speeding. Why? Why was not the fine doubled since all violations carry a double fine along the Parkway?
- 2. Why did she have family in a state car while on business?
- 3. She is claiming there is a racial motivation, but there should clearly be facts which point to the truth. Obviously a racial charge can damage this troopers career, so I believe once the facts are established the guilty party should be punished. If it is in fact the prosecutor, she should be investigated for her prejudice. Is there an oversight committee or any policing agency to determine the job she is doing? I can not help but to think with her attitude that she will give leniency to a black defendant, but a white man will encounter her wrath.
- 4. Will her racial charge just die now because she paid a summons?
  Unfortunately in the USA you can get away with murder, literally, if you have a racial defense. I believe it is because many people don't have the courage to stand up for what is right and just. In our country justice is blind but not always color blind.

I believe there is a degree of prejudice which many people must face on a daily basis. This account really could harm many legitimate, sincere claims. It is like the boy who cried wolf. A professional law official crying racism when in fact she broke the law is really pitiful. If we allow her to get away with this, is even more pitiful.

Could you please enlighten me on this incident and I would like your thoughts on the questions I posed. I would be grateful for your insight.





COMMUNITY MEETING - SHILOH BAPTIST CHURCH - PORT NORRIS

On October 3, 1998 at 10:00AM, a community meeting was sponsored by James Dunkins, Pastor of the Shiloh Baptist Church in Port Norris, President of the N.A.A.C.P. South Jersey Cumberland County Chapter, Dr. Russell Singleton and Cumberland County Human Relations Commission representative, Sam Clark. The meeting was requested by Pastor Dunkins as a result of a newspaper article written on September 1,1998 by the Philadelphia Inquirer accusing the State Police of racial profiling.

In addition to those mentioned above, SFC James W. Smith, Acting Station Commander of Port Norris Station, Det. I Kevin M. Milbourne #4904, Port Norris Station and Sgt. John M. Muccino #3728, Community Services Unit, Division Headquarters, were present and represented the New Jersey State Police. James A. Rocco, Chief of Detectives, Cumberland County Prosecutors Office, John Jones, Prosecutor of Commercial Township, Patrolman Lance Geissel and Sam Allen, Community Service Unit of the Millville Police Department were also present. There were fifty residents from the Port Norris community who also attended the meeting.

Dora Martin, an elderly black resident stood up complaining about the State Police racial profiling. During her address she verbally attacked Det. I Milbourne, a black trooper raised in Port Norris, calling him "a flunky", which brought strong reactions from Dr. Singleton and several audience members. Det. I Milbourne, sat proudly and exhibited outstanding self control and discipline. After her rambling Det. I Milbourne addressed the forum stating, "I am not a flunky, but I am a proud member of the New Jersey State Police and I have worked very hard to get where I am today". Det. I Milbourne delivered a very emotional speech about why he became a member of the New Jersey State Police. Det. I Milbourne spoke of his parents and how they instilled their family values and respect for the law, which carried over into his life. At the conclusion of his address, Det. I Milbourne received a standing ovation from the audience. Det. I Milbourne delivered his speech with sincerity and respect to all present. He is a credit and asset to the New Jersey State Police and the Port Norris Station.

Several members of the forum expressed an interest concerning internal investigations and how they are handled. I explained S.O.P. (B-10), procedures in filing an internal investigation and the routing of the investigation reports. I made an emotional pledge to the residents of Port Norris that abuse does not happen in the Port Norris Station, and if it did occur, that trooper would be brought up on charges. I instruct the personnel at the Port Norris Station to respect all member of the community and treat them like you would treat your own mother.

Sgt. John M. Muccino #3728, Community Service Unit, Division Headquarters, addressed the forum on the upcoming community policing unit. This unit will help race relations between the police and residents by opening up more communication and community policing. I explained to the members of the meeting that the idea is to get the troopers out of their cars, whether on foot or bicycles, and to mingle with the community. The community policing personnel will attend all community meeting and functions to get the community and police working together. This was received extremely well by the residents of Port Norris.

Other lawsuits across the country successfully have challenged race-based traffic stops in the past decade. Yet the practice continues unabated. It is a problem that desperately needs more than piecemeal judicial attention.

In 1992, for example, the Maryland ACLU successfully sued after Maryland state troopers on I-95 stopped Robert Wilkins, a black man who happened also to be a Harvard Law School graduate and public defender. Maryland quickly settled the case and agreed to judicial monitoring. In 1995 the ACLU settled a similar lawsuit in Tinicum Township just outside Philadelphia. And in 1996 a New Jersey judge dismissed 19 traffic cases when the public defenders showed that police there had engaged in racially disproportionate stops.

Studies show a consistent pattern. Monitoring in Maryland showed that over a three-year period, 1995 through 1997, 70 percent of the motorists the police stopped on I-95 were black, even though black motorists made up only about 17 percent of the traffic and of the speeders on that road.

A 1992 Orlando Sentinel study based on police videotapes similarly found that while about 5 percent of the drivers on

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a Florida interstate were dark skinned, nearly 70 percent of those stopped were black or Hispanic, and more than 80 percent of the cars searched were driven by blacks and Hispanics.

Tapes of individual stops reinforced the statistics. In one of the relatively rare stops of a white driver, Sgt. Dale Anderson asks the motorist how he is doing. When the man answers, "Not very good," Anderson replies, "Could be worse -- could be black."

These practices undermine the legitimacy of the criminal justice system and thereby hamper law enforcement. The more that people believe the state is fair, the more likely they are to internalize its mores and play by the rules. By engaging in a practice that has made "driving while black" a common phrase in minority communities, police actually have fed the forces that encourage criminal behavior.

But decisions such as Judge Gertner's, while they send an important message, are not the best way to address this problem. When a judge relies on broad statistics to reduce an individual defendant's sentence, as Gertner did, her action inevitably raises questions about fit -- even if as a statistical matter blacks are stopped disproportionately, how do we know that Alexander Leviner, the defendant before Gertner, was himself stopped because of his race?

At the same time, if we bar relief absent individualized proof that a driver was stopped because of his race, the issue rarely will be addressed. Problems of proof are extremely difficult to overcome in individual cases, even when the reality of disproportionate enforcement across the board is impossible to deny.

A legislative response is needed. A bill pending in Congress would require the Department of Justice to study the racial demographics of traffic enforcement across the country. But the bill does not go far enough. Police should be required to maintain and report to the public the racial characteristics of their traffic stops as a matter of course. The reason race-based stops have been tolerated for so long is that they remain largely hidden. Most police departments do not keep records of the racial breakdown

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of traffic stops, and those that do rarely make them public. The vacuum of information only fuels speculation about the scope of the problem.

Bringing the issue to light might itself reduce officers' reliance on race, especially to the extent that they are relying on relatively subconscious stereotypes. But in addition, national statistics would tell us whether this is a problem of national proportions. At this stage, the black community thinks so, but it is less clear that the rest of the country shares that concern. We need to stop putting our collective head in the sand with respect to what may be one of the most widespread examples of explicit official racial discrimination.

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

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

We need to stop putting our collective head in the sand with respect to what may be one of the most widespread examples of explicit official racial discrimination.

The attached S.P.I.R.I.T. Training Module, Marked #04, January 1999, is the result of previous meetings with SFC K. Moore, CAD/RMS Unit Head; myself; LTC Dunlop, Executive Officer; and yourself.

The attached Interoffice Communication of January 21, 1999, explains a potential problem with the race codes listed in the S.P.I.R.I.T. Training Module and suggests a solution. I was not satisfied with the recommended solution and further meetings with my staff resulted in the attached Interoffice Communication of January 28, 1999.

I believe the addition of code "J" for a white Hispanic and Code "K" for a black Hispanic will offer a solution both for the Troopers calling in the motor vehicle stops and for the Division regarding statistical data.

### DAILY TRAINING MODULE

### C.A.D. INFORMATION UP-DATE

1. When troopers supply the driver and passenger descriptions while calling in motor vehicle stops, the race will be given as "White", "Black", "Native American" or "Asian" <u>ONLY</u>. The information, along with the appropriate gender code, can be entered into the CAD screen as follows:  $\underline{W}$  - White,  $\underline{B}$  - Black,  $\underline{I}$  - Native American (Indian),  $\underline{A}$  - Asian

ONLY the above four choices are to be used. In the event a trooper mistakenly identifies the occupants of the vehicle prior to approaching, the proper correction will be made when the trooper returns to his/her troop car, regardless of enforcement action.

- 2. When a Troop "D" car calls in a stop or other incident that is off the Turnpike, and other than Turnpike ODU is utilized, the trooper must inform dispatch that they are a Troop "D" car. The dispatcher will log the troop car with the letter "D" before the actual troop car number (i.e., D914, D933, etc.). This will alleviate the problem of troop cars from different troops with the same identification numbers. This will also apply to Troop "E" cars (i.e., E187, E212, etc.), when that troop is on-line with the CAD system.
- 3. The following procedures have been set forth in the event there is a problem or question with regard to the CAD system.

The CAD/RMS Unit has received several calls from Squad Supervisors of various Road Stations voicing concerns over the implementation of the four (4) race codes, Black (B), White (W), Asian (A), and Native American (I). The concern centers around the conception of Hispanic as a race and the restriction the four codes put on describing the driver of a vehicle which could lead to a misidentification of a wanted vehicle or person. The calling personnel feel there should be an additional identifier such as Latino (L) to cover persons of Central American and South American descent. The Troopers give the following scenario to support their position:

Trooper Jones in car 247 stops a car with a Mexican driver. The subject is brown skinned with straight black hair. Under the current scenario, Trooper Jones must make a choice as to whether the driver is black or white. Trooper Jones advises over the radio the subject is black and proceeds to approach the vehicle. At this point, Trooper Jones is assaulted and the suspect vehicle flees the scene. Trooper Smith, in a back-up unit responding to check on Trooper Jones who has not okayed on the stop, spots a similar vehicle to the one Trooper Jones stopped. Unable to see the plate, Trooper Smith observes the Mexican driver, makes a decision that he is white and therefore, it is not the vehicle stopped by Trooper Jones. If Trooper Jones had been afforded the opportunity to describe the subject as Latino, Trooper Smith would have been more likely to believe it was the suspect vehicle fleeing the scene.

The above scenario creates a conflict between the need to gather statistical data as compared to the need to have accurate and consistent identifiers of individuals to help insure the safety of Troopers and the arrest of criminal suspects. The population diversity of the State of New Jersey includes a great number of Central and South American people. While completing arrest reports, Troopers have the time to determine if a Central or South American subject is black or white, or if a black, white, Asian or Native American is Hispanic. However, during the initial contact, an arbitrary and inconsistent decision must be made; a decision that provides an opportunity for a suspect to go free.

The CAD/RMS Unit offers the following suggestions:

- Define and instruct a reliable and consistent policy for determining the race of individuals. Our current policy leaves the interpretation of race up to the individual. This is arbitrary and inconsistent as one persons definition of who is white and black may differ between individuals. A policy should be developed to more consistently and accurately classify people.
- 2. Include a Race Code for Latino.

The CAD/RMS Unit is recommending the implementation of two additional codes for Troopers to utilize when calling in the race description of the driver of a motor vehicle. In addition to the current race codes of W for White, B for Black, A for Asian and I for Native American, Troopers will be able to use:

J for White Hispanic K for Black Hispanic

Troopers may call in the description such as White, Black, Asian, Native American, White Hispanic or Black Hispanic and it will be up to the operator to enter the appropriate code for what is called in.
