Restorative and Transformative Justice for Youths and Communities Pilot Program

APPLICATION

November 1, 2022 - October 31, 2024

BACKGROUND & PURPOSE

The Restorative and Transformative Justice for Youths and Communities Pilot Program, P.L. 2021, c.196 (Pilot Program) creates a two-year Pilot Program to develop an innovative restorative and transformative continuum of care in the municipalities of Camden, Newark, Paterson, and Trenton. The Pilot Program is intended to help prevent young people in New Jersey from entering the youth justice system and to support young people being released from a Juvenile Justice Commission (Commission) facility. The Pilot Program will greatly enhance the funding initiatives currently in place to serve youth in their communities. Pursuant to P.L. 2021, c.196 each of the four identified municipalities shall have a restorative justice hub that will provide community-based enhanced diversion and reentry wraparound services. Counties must actively engage communities and properly fund services to divert youth from formal justice system involvement and reintegrate youth back into their communities successfully.

GOALS OF THE PILOT PROGRAM

The goals, as identified in P.L. 2021, c.196, are as follows:

- 1. To increase participation in education, vocational programming, and employment. Youth participants in the Pilot Program shall receive academic support, depending on personal development goals, and shall be connected to secondary schools, alternative schools, vocational schools, apprenticeship programs and colleges and universities. The program shall collaborate with local community college's admissions and academic support programs, and offer workshops that include financial aid planning. Participants seeking employment shall be linked to vocational or job readiness training. The selected partner-providers participating in the Pilot Program shall be trained in and utilize evidence-based and evidence-informed practices with respect to the provision of their respective services;
- 2. To increase participation in mental health and well-being programming. The program shall employ trauma-informed practices and connect youth to licensed outpatient mental health care facilities and professionals. The program shall create safe, caring environments to address physical health, mental health and substance use disorder conditions and facilitate healing for youth, families, and communities.
- 3. To decrease incidents of harmful and unlawful behavior. The program shall work with youth to comply with their probation or parole plan, as applicable. Moreover, the program shall employ trauma-informed practices, violence reduction, and peacemaking supports and tools to address harmful and unlawful behavior;
- 4. To have restorative justice hubs establish working relationships with local law enforcement agencies, courts, prosecutors, and defense attorneys to support the diversion of youth away from arrests and prosecution and towards participation in restorative justice services provided in the hubs;

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- 5. To improve the socioemotional and behavioral responses of youth within communities through the use of more appropriate, and less punitive, interventions, thereby establishing more restorative interventions; and
- 6. To increase program participation rates in other restorative and transformative justice programs in the municipalities in which the Pilot Program is established.

TARGET POPULATION

The Pilot Program is established to support young people being released from a Commission facility and to help prevent young people in New Jersey from entering the youth justice system in the first instance. Services provided by each restorative justice hub shall be made available to youth who reside in the pilot municipalities and who are referred by:

- school administrators in lieu of suspension, expulsion, or referral to law enforcement for a school-based incident;
- a local law enforcement official, as part of a stationhouse adjustment or in lieu of formal charging;
- the court, as part of a diversion, detention alternative, deferred disposition, or probation disposition;
- the Commission, for youth transitioning home from a Commission facility;
- a county juvenile detention center, for youth transitioning home from detention; and
- the Children's System of Care (CSOC) within the Department of Children and Families, or other appropriate party, for youth who are aging out of or not eligible for CSOC services.

A funded provider is expected to serve all youth returning from a Juvenile Justice Commission facility, so this could include young adults on parole up to the age of 26.

DEFINITIONS

For the purposes of this Notice of Availability of Funding (NOAF), the following definitions apply:

Restorative Justice Hubs – a physical space within the municipality where youth and families can heal, reconnect, and build healthy relationships in the community. The purpose of restorative justice hubs is to resolve local conflicts through dialogue instead of punitive measures.

Community Conferencing – a practice which addresses conflicts through a collective group session, consensual resolution, and decision-making processes to heal and repair harms. Community conferencing works for multiple types of conflicts involving the community, station house adjustments, juvenile court diversion, and reentry from youth incarceration.

APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS

This application provides information to allow each of the four eligible County Youth Services Commissions (YSC) to apply for the Restorative and Transformative Justice for Youths and Communities Pilot Program funding to develop innovative restorative and transformative justice continuums of care.

The information and forms are provided to direct the County/YSC in the development of the application for the Pilot Program funds for project period 11/1/22 to 10/31/24. The application must be received at the Juvenile Justice Commission on or before 5/9/22 at 3:00 pm. One original (single sided) application must be emailed to JJCYSCGrants@jjc.nj.gov. The application must include a cover letter from the County Youth Services Commission Co-Chairs, on behalf of the County Youth Services Commission, indicating that all sections of this application have been reviewed, discussed, and approved. The submission of the application must also include the County Youth Services Commission meeting minutes indicating approval of the application.

NOTE: Counties should anticipate that failure to submit a completed application that contains all of attachments will affect the timeline for review and approval of the application.

The County/YSC's application will be reviewed by the Commission to ensure it meets all required components. Feedback will be sent to the County/YSC within two to three weeks of the submission of its application. The County/YSC will have two weeks to respond to any feedback received from the Commission. Once all feedback is addressed, the application will be approved, and the County/YSC will receive its award for processing at the County level.

APPLICANT CONFERENCE

In an effort to assist counties in applying for these funds, an Applicant conference will be held via Microsoft Teams on 1/5/22 at 10:00 am. The Applicant conference is mandatory. Please read the NOAF and this Application in its entirety prior to the event and prepare any questions you have in advance. Please note, the information provided during this conference will not be made available in any other form to those who do not attend. Please R.S.V.P. via email to JJCYSCGrants@jjc.nj.gov by 1/4/22 at 4:00pm. In addition to the County YSC Administrator, it is strongly recommended that the YSC Chair(s) and YSC voting members, as well as a representative from the target municipality, attend the Applicant conference. If staff implementing this project have been identified, then they must also attend.

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EXPECTATIONS

- The application must be developed through an existing subcommittee of the YSC. However, additional members can be added as needed and membership subcommittee membership should be inclusive (see Attachment 1).
- The YSC must minimally receive and review an executive summary of the application, the timeline, and the budget in a timely manner prior to the YSC meeting for vote on the application. The full application must be made available to the YSC members upon request.
- In accordance with P.L. 2021, c.196, the County/YSC must ensure that each funded provider and individual providing services in the hub must receive training in restorative and transformative justice practices prior to the implementation of services.
- The County/YSC must ensure the funded provider meets all requirements as identified in the Required Training section of the application below.
- The YSC and each funded provider shall collect, maintain, and make available to the Commission any data required by the Commission to evaluate the Pilot Program and shall work with Commission staff or any third party the Commission engages to assist with the preparation of reports.
- Due to the potential of this Pilot program expanding statewide, the high public visibility, and the funding level, the County and the YSC must work with the Commission in program implementation, ongoing monitoring, and in the provision of technical assistance to the funded provider(s).
- The lead applicant implementing the hub, in addition to the provision of services, must have the knowledge of resources available in the County and the ability to provide referral services to additional programs and services as needed.
- In preparing for and holding the public meetings required pursuant to P.L. 2021, c.196, the County/YSC must coordinate with the Commission.
- Pursuant to P.L. 2021, c 196, the County/YSC shall engage in a competitive Request for Proposal (RFP) process to identify the provider to implement the Pilot Program.

APPLICATION NARRATIVE

The narrative must be double-spaced using standard 12-point font with 1-inch margins and must not exceed 50 pages (not including required attachments). Pursuant to P.L. 2021, c.196, each County YSC participating in the Pilot Program is required to hold a public meeting in its participating municipality, i.e., in Camden (Camden); Newark (Essex); Trenton (Mercer); and Paterson (Passaic), to announce the Pilot Program and inform the public of the rules, regulations, and processes for applying for the grant funds under the program.

• Structure of and Services Provided through the Restorative Justice Hub

Restorative Justice Hubs are defined as a physical space within the municipality where youth and families can heal, reconnect, and build healthy relationships in the community. Services and supports provided in the hub to eligible youth shall include, but are not limited to, the following:

1. Mental health services (e.g., individual, group, and family counseling services);

Juvenile Justice Commission Pilot Program Application Page 6 of 9 2. Substance use disorders treatment and recovery (e.g., individual and/or group counseling, education, inpatient, and referrals to more intensive programs and services);

3. Education support (e.g., academic tutoring services. behavioral health services to increase positive educational outcomes, school reintegration advocacy support staff such as parent/student rights, etc.);

4. Employment services (e.g., career readiness and stability, long-term employment preparation, resume writing workshops, and job interview preparation/mock interviews);

5. Housing support (e.g., assist with independent or transitional living, and stabilization services to allow or assist youth to remain in the home);

6. Financial literacy and debt support services (e.g., financial literacy trainings, credit education, dispute and resolution services, and identity theft awareness);

7. Life skills support services (e.g., nutrition/cooking workshops, time management, effective communication, and self-care healthy outlets and boundaries);

8. Social support services (e.g., linking to community services that may include care for children, food and housing subsidies, healthcare, job training, family empowerment);

9. Preventative mentoring services (e.g., mentors paired specific to the youth's need and interests); and

10. Community conferences and/or peace circles to heal and repair harms caused by youth as a result of their behavior (e.g., victim impact and empathy component to program or service provision).

Provision of services should be culturally competent and culturally reflective of the youth population to be served.

a) What will be the County/YSC's process for identifying the physical location of the hub? For example:

• Required Training

In accordance with P.L. 2021, c.196, each County/YSC must ensure that each service provider participating in the Pilot Program receives training in restorative and transformative justice practices prior to the implementation of services. All grant funded staff must also be trained. The training entity/agency selected should have credible expertise in providing restorative training services to other communities, schools, governments, organizations, non-profits, etc., specific to justice- or court-involved youth. Counties must ensure the applicant selected to operate the hub is sufficiently prepared to implement restorative community conferences and peace circles in accordance with the definitions of those approaches included in this application above.

Budget with Narrative

In accordance with P.L. 2021, c.196, no more than fifteen percent of the monies shall be used by the County Youth Services Commissions for administrative purposes. Administrative funds provided are to be used for the overall management and implementation of the Restorative and Transformative Justice for Youths and Communities Pilot Program. This includes, but is not limited to, the hiring of staff responsible for reviewing applications; providing technical assistance to funded programs; reviewing, approving, and processing all programmatic and fiscal reports and any programmatic and budget changes; monitoring overall contract compliance; providing restorative justice training to relevant stakeholders; and collecting required data. The Commission will provide, as upfront funding to the County for startup costs, an initial disbursement in the amount of twenty-five percent of the award, and the remainder of the funds will be reimbursed on a quarterly basis after the initial disbursement of funds has been expended. Each County shall provide to its funded provider, as upfront funding for startup costs, an initial disbursement of twenty-five percent of the funded provider's total award.

TEMPLATE LANGUAGE FOR COUNTY RFPS

Notwithstanding existing local public contracting laws, each county must incorporate into their Request for Proposal (RFP) any boiler plate language provided by the Juvenile Justice Commission (Commission) to articulate components of the Pilot Program to which applicants must adhere. Before issuing its RFP, each county must share its draft RFP with the Commission in order to ensure the RFP meets the goals and guidelines of P.L. 2021, c.196 and N.J.A.C. 13:90-4.

Below is information that must be in each county's RFP:

Target Population

The Pilot Program is established to support young people being released from a Commission facility and to help prevent young people in New Jersey from entering the youth justice system in the first instance. Services provided by each restorative justice hub shall be made available to youth who reside in the pilot municipalities and who are referred by:

- school administrators in lieu of suspension, expulsion, or referral to law enforcement for a school-based incident;
- a local law enforcement official, as part of a stationhouse adjustment or in lieu of formal charging;
- the court, as part of a diversion, detention alternative, deferred disposition, or probation disposition;
- the Commission, for youth transitioning home from a Commission facility;
- a county juvenile detention center, for youth transitioning home from detention; and
- the Children's System of Care (CSOC) within the Department of Children and Families, or other appropriate party, for youth who are aging out of or not eligible for CSOC services.

A funded provider is expected to serve all youth returning from a Juvenile Justice Commission facility, so this could include young adults on parole up to the age of 26.

Expectations

• In accordance with P.L. 2021, c.196, the funded provider must ensure that each subcontract and individual providing services in the hub receives training in restorative and transformative justice practices prior to the implementation of services.

- The funded provider must collect, maintain, and make available to the County/YSC and the Commission any data required by the Commission to evaluate the Pilot Program and shall work with Commission staff or any third party the Commission engages to assist with the preparation of reports.
- Due to the potential of this Pilot program expanding statewide, the high public visibility, and the funding level, the successful applicant must work with the County/YSC and the Commission in program implementation and on-going monitoring.
- The funded provider implementing the hub, in addition to the provision of services, must have the knowledge of resources available in the County and the ability to provide referral services to additional programs and services as needed.

Services to be provided through the Restorative Justice Hub

Community-based enhanced reentry wraparound services

- Services and supports provided in the Hub to eligible youth shall include, but are not limited to, the following:
 - 1. Mental health services (e.g., individual, group, and family counseling services);
 - Substance use disorders treatment and recovery (e.g., individual and/or group counseling, education, inpatient, and referrals to more intensive programs and services);
 - 3. Education support (e.g., academic tutoring services, behavioral health services to increase positive educational outcomes, school reintegration advocacy support staff such as parent/student rights, etc.);
 - 4. Employment services (e.g., career readiness and stability, long-term employment preparation, resume writing workshops, and job interview preparation/mock interviews);
 - 5. Housing support (e.g., assist with independent or transitional living, and stabilization services to allow or assist youth to remain in the home);
 - 6. Financial literacy and debt support services (e.g., financial literacy trainings, credit education, dispute and resolution services, and identity theft awareness);
 - 7. Life skills support services (e.g., nutrition/cooking workshops, time management, effective communication, and self-care healthy outlets and boundaries);
 - 8. Social support services (e.g., linking to community services that may include care for children, food and housing subsidies, healthcare, job training, family empowerment);
 - Preventative mentoring services (e.g., mentors paired specific to the youth's need and interests); and
 - 10. Community conferences and/or peace circles to heal and repair harms caused by youth as a result of their behavior (e.g., victim impact and empathy component to program or service provision).

Provision of services should be culturally competent and culturally reflective of the youth population to be served.

- Provide a detail description of the overall program design and the services identified above (1-10) that will be provided within the restorative justice hub, including a designation as to which services will:
 - o be funded to support youth presently living in the community.
 - o serve youth returning to the community from a Commission facility; and
 - o serve both populations.
- Describe which evidence-based and evidence-informed practices will be utilized with respect to the provision services.
- Describe in detail the efforts that the applicant will employ to ensure that sanctions and services are culturally appropriate.

Data Collection

- The funded provider and its subcontractors shall collect, maintain, and make available to the Commission any data required by the Commission to evaluate the Pilot Program and shall work with Commission staff or any third party the Commission engages to assist with the preparation of reports required pursuant P.L. 2021, c.196.
- Each funded provider shall also use the Juvenile Automated Management System (JAMS) for reporting purposes.

<u>Required Training</u> (This is only required to be in the county's RFP if the county is not funding the training)

In accordance with P.L. 2021, c.196, the County must ensure that each service provider participating in the Pilot Program receives intensive training in restorative and transformative justice practices prior to the implementation of services.

Applicant's seeking to provide the required training must meets the following criteria:

- A. The Restorative Justice Training is evidenced-based and replicable. Training Provider reports data/evidence to support effectiveness of the identified approach and includes a model for easy replication such as identified processes and a facilitators script.
- B. The Training Entity/Agency has credible expertise in providing restorative justice training services to other communities, schools, governments, organizations, non-profits,

- etc., specific to justice- or court-involved youth. Must include the training entity's qualifications and experience as a provider of restorative trainings.
- C. Training services/components include(ed) role play scenarios and on-site observation/consultation to oversee initial implementation of services.
- **D.** A description of the restorative justice training(s). Must include any issued certifications/licenses, training components/hours, qualifications of trainers and whether any certificates/licenses, CECs are issued.

Note: An individual may request an exemption from this training requirementfrom the Commission upon a satisfactory showing of proof of prior training on implementing these practices with young people or students. Proof of training must include a copy of the certification or licensed received, dates when the training occurred, length of the training, the entity that provided the training, and a summary of the training curriculum or agenda.

Please note that the Commission does not endorse any particular organization but provides the below for informational purposes only. The county can choose any provider that meets the following criteria:

- A. The Restorative Justice Training is evidenced-based and replicable. Training Provider reports data/evidence to support effectiveness of the identified approach and includes a model for easy replication such as identified processes and a facilitators script.
- B. The Training Entity/Agency has credible expertise in providing restorative justice training services to other communities, schools, governments, organizations, non-profits, etc., specific to justice- or court-involved youth. Must include the training entity's qualifications and experience as a provider of restorative trainings.
- C. Training services/components include(ed) role play scenarios and on-site observation/consultation to oversee initial implementation of services.
- **D.** A description of the restorative justice training(s). Must include any issued certifications/licenses, training components/hours, qualifications of trainers and whether any certificates/licenses, CECs are issued.

Note: An individual may request an exemption from this training requirement from the Commission upon a satisfactory showing of proof of prior training in regard to implementing these practices with young people. Proof of training must include a copy of the certification or licensed received, dates when the training occurred, length of the training, the entity that provided the training, and a summary of the training curriculum or agenda.
