

## FEDERAL ENERGY MATTERS – QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

RFQ - Question	Answer
Does the contemplated work pursuant to the RFQ include appellate work?	Potentially yes, depending on the matter, so the firm should have the ability to handle appellate matters.
Does the RFQ cover all entities regulated by FERC (e.g. natural gas, electric, hydro-electric)?	Yes
Does the RFQ contemplate only challenges to FERC Certificates or related rulings, or does it also include challenges to environmental permitting decisions?	This RFQ is not intended to cover environmental permitting matters.
Which potential companies would be subject to the RFQ?	Any companies subject to FERC regulation where the BPU might challenge an applicable order. But if there are potential conflicts, they will be evaluated on a case by case basis. A potential future conflict does not disqualify a firm for selection to the outside counsel list.
Are there any specific, currently docketed matters that are subject to this engagement?	No
With respect to the use of the word “transmission,” does the information sought concern federal experience in electric transmission cases, gas transmission cases, or both?	Experience with either qualifies.
Concerning the requirement that we “Confirm that your firm covers litigation costs, any bonds required by a court, and any potential liability under Fed.R.Civ.P. 11,” please clarify the requirement.	Firms selected as outside counsel need to advance litigation costs [etc], subject to reimbursement upon payment of submitted invoices.

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Is the Scope of Services limited to electricity matters before the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission? Or does it include gas pipeline matters?	Electric is a significant but not exclusive interest.
Are you accepting electronic signatures on documents required for the RFQ submission? And have any notarized signature requirements been waived or modified due to the COVID-19 pandemic?	Yes
