10	Please share brief information on your subdivisions overarching goals and values to provide context for this year's spending decisions	<p>Our overarching goals have been the same for a couple of years, in that community engagement for prevention of substance abuse/overdoses. Disseminating information, medical rescue intervention tools and resources, and providing a place for people to go, easily, should they need help (and without stigma or consequence). This year we have been focused on our digital engagement site, but also providing the tools and equipment to our officers to be able to deploy medical equipment and naloxone from their person and from their vehicles safely, quickly and effectively. We've purchased narcan pouches for officers to wear on their person, medical deploy kits to be mounted to all vehicle headrests, containing naloxone and rescue aids to respond quickly to overdose calls. We've also added to our 24/7 Straight to Treatment Program by creating something similar to a "Sobriety Coin" in the form of a challenge coin that advertises our STT program, a phone number, and the fact that they can reach us for substance treatment without any stigma associated. We continue to run a Project Medicine Drop Program that allows safe disposal of opioids and other unused medications, 24/7, by way of a large metal repository in our front foyer. This keeps those dangerous medications out of the hands of those that should not have them. We also provide Deterra pouches for residents to dispose of medication tablets safely, and discarding at home rather than having to come in.</p>

If yes, please explain.	Our spending has been solely based on the needs that our officers respond to on a regular basis, in terms of overdoses and live saving/rescue interventions by use of nasal naloxone, and also by way of the naloxone leave behind program. Our officers have, at times, responded to multiple opioid overdoses in one day, sometimes the same person on the same day, so our spending represents the everyday needs for our community, and of our officers that need the tools and resources to react to opioid overdoses and prevention of same.

The EGPD advertises our resources for treatment and safe medicine disposal efforts via social media accounts and via our new community engagement department webpage, where citizens can ask questions and submit tips to our officers. We also host Straight to Treatment program events with the Prosecutors Office here in the Township, and during public community events, we use our EGPD tent to set up a resources and information area where community members can physical talk and interact with the officers and the items association with our programs.
