10	<p>Please share brief information on your subdivisions overarching goals and values to provide context for this year's spending decisions</p>	<p>Our subdivision is strategically allocating funds to support and enhance a range of opioid-related initiatives throughout the County. These investments are directed toward comprehensive programs designed to address prevention, treatment, harm reduction, and recovery. Key areas of funding include:</p> <p>Diversion Court Programs: Supporting alternatives to incarceration for individuals with opioid use disorders, offering rehabilitation and judicial oversight as part of a restorative justice approach.</p> <p>Opioid Treatment Initiatives: Funding evidence-based treatment proposals aimed at expanding access to medication-assisted treatment (MAT), counseling, and support services.</p> <p>Prevention and Misuse Education Programs: Enhancing community education efforts to prevent opioid misuse, with targeted outreach in schools, healthcare settings, and at-risk populations.</p> <p>Harm Reduction Strategies: Supporting initiatives such as naloxone distribution, syringe exchange programs, and safe use education to reduce the immediate dangers of opioid misuse.</p> <p>Justice-Involved Support Programs: Providing treatment and case management services for individuals within the criminal justice system who are impacted by opioid use.</p> <p>Opioid Case Management Services: Coordinating care and services for individuals dealing with opioid use disorder, including connection to treatment, housing, employment support, and long-term recovery resources.</p> <p>These targeted investments reflect our commitment to a holistic, data-driven approach in combating the opioid crisis and improving health outcomes across the County.</p>
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11	How did you decide the best way to use the opioid abatement funds your subdivision received this reporting year? For example, did you rely on evidence-based or evidence-informed practices or strategies, the list of Opioid Remediation uses, a needs assessment, a strategic plan, or an epidemiological analysis? If yes, please explain.	To ensure our efforts were both strategic and impactful, we began by utilizing the County's Needs Assessment Survey for mental health and addiction services. This tool helped us identify specific areas where additional resources were most needed to address opioid misuse. In parallel, we collaborated closely with the County Prosecutor's Office, leveraging data they had been collecting related to opioid overdoses, fatalities, and arrests involving opioid-related offenses. Understanding the importance of avoiding duplication and maximizing the effectiveness of available resources, we intentionally paused to monitor which programs would be launched by the State and by local municipalities. This allowed us to identify gaps and opportunities where our funding could be directed to support underserved areas or innovative initiatives—ensuring our investments complemented, rather than overlapped with, existing efforts.

Our process is for Case Managers to meet individuals one-on-one in person in the jail, in the State Prisons, or in our offices where we will complete intakes. For example, staff meets incarcerated persons weekly at the Bergen County Jail. Using our evidence-based intake during personal interviews, we are able to get a full picture of client demographics. We then develop an individualized plan focused on client needs. All of our services are based on a wrap-around service model and a custom fit for each of our clients. After needs are assessed, referrals may be made to community

Case management and supervision, combined with counseling and recovery treatment, facilitates clients to turn away from their prior destructive lifestyles. Our protocols address the many areas that caused clients to become justice involved in the first place. In many cases, we find a mental health disorder compounded by self-medication leads to substance abuse. By reintegrating former offenders seamlessly into the community, we reduce recidivism, and make our community stronger economically. With our extensive knowledge of community services, we have made a difference; empowering formerly incarcerated individuals by transitioning them back home to lead productive, self-sustaining lives.</p> <p>The core of our work is based on solid evidence based practices, driving the engine leading to positive outcomes for the individuals who participate. Once a prospective client is introduced to Transition Professionals, we provide an initial intake and then develop an effective plan. Documents include an Intake Assessment, a Consent for Release of Information, a Participation Agreement and a Mini-Mental State Examination (MMSE-2), for rapid clinical assessment/screen for cognitive impairment.² We feel that our methods and use of systems such as the Mini-Mental State Examination, 2nd Edition (MMSE-2) affords us a comprehensive state-of-the-art, evidence-based process for assessment/case management. A biopsychosocial validated risk/needs assessment may also be administered. Our program leads to positive outcomes for clients. 13	Please state this program's statement of impact.	<p>TCADR proposes to address the needs of justice-involved individuals with Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) and co-occurring Mental Health (MH)/OUD by connecting individuals to evidence-based services at different intervention points across the criminal justice continuum: prevention, diversion, incarceration, and post-incarceration. Justice-involved individuals will be connected to recovery support services and evidence-informed treatment, including medication assisted treatment (MAT) and related services. Through the utilization of evidence-based interventions and evidence-informed best practices, the proposed services are comprehensive, engage multiple systems of support, and are community-based. Due to the breadth of experience TCADR has in implementing the services proposed with the identified partners, all programming can begin upon notification of award. TCADR will serve as the convener of multiple law enforcement related entities who have committed to a collaborative, system-wide approach to supporting individuals with OUD. The system partners whose collaboration is explicit in this proposal include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> the Bergen County Prosecutor's Office (BCPO); Public Safety Office of Communication (PSOC) central dispatch center for Bergen County; local law enforcement; Bergen County Department of Probation; Bergen County Recovery Court; and the Bergen County Sheriff's Department. <p>Upon notification of grant award, formal MOUs will be established outlining the roles and responsibilities of each party to implement the activities described. The cornerstone of the proposed service delivery system is TCADR's 24/7 addiction hotline, the single entry point of contact for law enforcement system partners to streamline inquiries and facilitate access to essential recovery support services for the population of individuals to be served. Responding to calls made to the</p>

Please state this program's statement of impact. cont.	<p>hotline are the TCADR Patient Navigator/Case Manager (PN/CM) who answers calls 365 days a year from 7 am until 7 pm, and an on-call Certified Peer Recovery Specialist (CPRS) who responds every night between the hours of 7 pm and 7 am. The CPRS offers lived experience, empathy, and—most importantly—hope. CPRSs are individuals with lived experience of addiction and recovery and specialized training around the use of their lived experience to guide individuals toward recovery stability. All CPRSs receive regular supervision by a licensed clinical professional to ensure ethical and appropriate services delivery. The PN is qualified to assess for and facilitate appropriate treatment placement. Utilizing motivational interviewing techniques, the caller is helped to identify the areas which concern them and are connected to the services and providers that can move them toward stability and recovery. Local law enforcement frequently contact the 24/7 hotline to request that a CPRS meet with a community member challenged by their own OUD or that of a loved one.</p> <p>Following is a description of the range of services proposed:</p> <p>1. Prevention (Pre-arrest/Pre-arraignment): TCADR will collaborate with local police departments in Bergen County to increase awareness of services available to individuals and families affected by OUD. This will occur through police department training and community engagement activities.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Training - Law enforcement personnel agree to participate in a 1-hour training with TCADR to: increase understanding of addiction and recovery, stigma and language, and the role of community-based recovery services, along with information about the 24/7 addiction hotline as a single entry point to connect them and their community members to services. This training will be modeled on best practices identified by SAMHSA's "Connecting

To be responsive to the needs of a community, bi-lingual Spanish, Korean-, and Polish-speaking on staff with TCADR may be available to assist with translation. conversations. Increased visibility of police officers and their partnership with recovery support providers assists in shifting the community’s perception of how law enforcement approach SUD. Ultimately, the goal is for residents to know their local police department is a safe place where mental health/substance use issues can be discussed. <p>2. Diversion (arrest): In February 2024, a directive issued by the Bergen County Prosecutor states, “...Arresting officers will now inform eligible arrestees that if they agree to consult with a Recovery Specialist for SUD assistance and treatment, their charges will be flagged for consideration of a downgrade to the Central Municipal Diversion Program.” The directive requires all Bergen County police departments to contact TCADR’s 24/7 addiction hotline, a central point of access, when a person is charged with a low-level offense in their jurisdiction. Although voluntary, the arrested individual is encouraged to meet with a Recovery Support specialist to engage with services. If the hotline call is received between 7 am and 7 pm, a CPRS is deployed to the department; if between 7 pm and 7 am, a CPRS will speak to the individual by phone and schedule a face-to-face meeting for the next day.</p> <p>3. Post-Incarceration: Individuals may be incarcerated for varying periods of time, necessitating a multi-pronged approach to post-incarceration recovery services.</p>

Please state this program's statement of impact. cont.	<p>(1) Central Judicial Processing (CJP) court: Following an arrest and transfer to the Bergen County Jail, CPRSs will offer services to those with an OUD following their meeting with the CJP Court judge once released to the community. This will require the collaboration of the CJP court judge, prosecutor assigned to the case, and public defender.</p> <p>(2) Release from jail: Individuals with an OUD who are incarcerated and housed at the Bergen County jail will, prior to release, be offered the opportunity to connect with a CPRS and a PN/Case Manager (CM) to assist with accessing recovery support, treatment, and other services. This service will be facilitated through collaboration with the Bergen County Sheriff's Department.</p> <p>(3) Recovery Court: Working in collaboration with the Recovery Court judge, Assistant Prosecutor, and the Recovery Court Coordinator, TCADR's recovery support services team will educate all Recovery Court involved individuals with an OUD, including those with co-occurring MH/OUD, and offer an opportunity to connect with a CPRS and PN/CM to support them on their recovery journey.</p> <p>(4) Probation: Department of Probation officers and managers will receive training from TCADR to increase their understanding of addiction and recovery, stigma and language, and the role of community-based recovery support services. Formal processes to assign clients to recovery support services when violations occur will be established upon notification of grant award. Connecting clients with OUD to a PN and/or CPRS through TCADR's 24/7 hotline will enhance their ability to comply with the requirements of probation. The ability to communicate by phone is fundamental to the service delivery structure. As such, participants engaged in any of these services who do not have secure telephone access will be provided with a TracPhone, a pre-paid, no-contract</p>

The range of services described in this proposal address several areas on the continuum of justice involvement; however, all proposed services include the following components:</p> <p>Recovery Planning and Assessment: Once an individual agrees to accept recovery support services, they are connected with a CPRS who they will work with to create a personalized recovery management plan. Utilizing the evidence-based practice of motivational interviewing, the CPRS uses this collaborative, person-centered style of communication designed to initiate and/or strengthen motivation to change to assist the client with exploring options that will sustain as well as other areas of concern, a TCADR PN/CM will be engaged. The PN/CM will implement Screening, Brief Intervention and Referral to Treatment, (SBIRT), an evidence-based tool to conduct brief assessments/interventions with clients. Inherent in the model is the use of motivational interviewing. Not only does the assessment phase include providing clients with support and connections to OUD treatment services and co-occurring MH/SUD treatment, it includes opportunities to help address other health, educational, housing, social service, and financial concerns needed for recovery. The recovery support services team utilizes a trauma informed approach to service delivery, recognizing the widespread impact of trauma and its influence on potential paths to recovery. Recovery Check Ins: Peer recovery support specialists will meet with clients in the community and/or by phone, at minimum, 3 times per week the first week of services, 2 times the second week, and once a week thereafter for the next 6 weeks. Clients will have the opportunity to remain working with a CPRS and PN/CM for up to 6 months of services. If the client seeks additional recovery support, they will join TCADR's</p>
