New Jersey State Council on the Arts - Folk Arts Program

To support the cultural richness of New Jersey, and to broaden public appreciation and understanding of our diversity, the New Jersey State Council on the Arts has established a multifaceted *Folk Arts Infrastructure Program* and has supported the development of several regional Folklife Centers in the state. The Centers work in partnership to encourage deeper cultural understanding by conducting fieldwork research in their regions and presenting programs aiming to preserve and highlight the abundant variety of folk arts and traditions practiced in New Jersey.

The State Arts Council supports folk arts programs that enable communities to pass on their most valuable artistic traditions while preserving our state's rich cultural resources. Organizations may apply for *Folk Arts Grants* to help preserve and share with a broader public the unique traditional arts that are practiced in New Jersey communities.

The *Folk Arts Apprenticeship Grants* support cultural communities and encourage master artists to continue passing on their valued traditions to others by instructing apprentices, who are committed to preserving their cultural heritage.

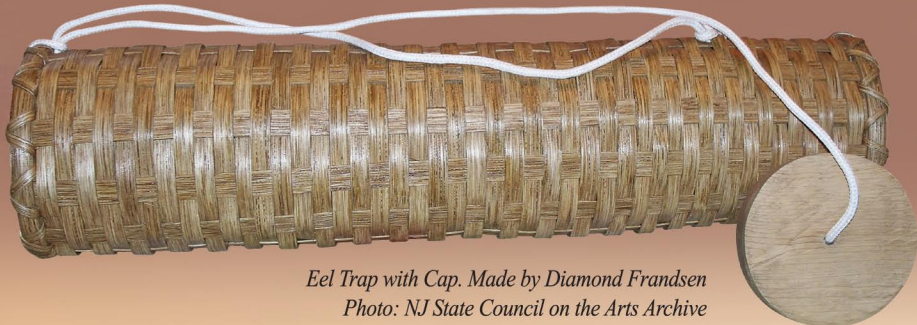





The research area of the Down Jersey Folklife Program includes the eight southernmost counties in New Jersey. It provides public programs such as exhibitions, different types of performances and other artist-driven initiatives that result from careful research and planning. Some examples of art forms presented include: African American oyster-shucking songs and quilt making, the South Jersey tales of the Jersey Devil; Japanese *hoh-daiko* drumming and *minyō dances*; Greek and Bulgarian *hora* (circle dances), Guatemalan and Romanian weavings; Native American bead work and pine needle baskets; Ukrainian *nyzynka* embroidery; Italian and Slovenian bobbin lace, Turkish *ebru* painting, Mexican ceramics and woodcarvings; Indian *mehendi*, Philippine *rondalya* music, Cambodian court dances, and Albanian harvest songs.

The Jersey Shore Folklife Center provides professional oversight for folk art programs and exhibits at Tuckerton Seaport and manages the artist roster and demonstrator schedule, the Folk and Traditional Artist in Residence Program, the Jersey Traditions and Voices of the Barnegat Bay outreach programs and changing artist exhibits in J.C. Parker's Decoy Shop. J.C. Parker's Decoy Shop and Hurley Conklin's Decoy Shop offer ongoing opportunities to meet decoy carvers and to learn firsthand the art of carving wooden decoys.

Traditions are passed down to the next generation through the Youth Boatbuilding Club and Youth Carving Club. Popular classes include surfboard shaping, decoy carving, boatbuilding, and basketmaking. Learn to weave a berry basket or paint a flattie decoy. Take a ride on a garvey with a commercial clammer and learn the history of clamming in the Bay. Visitors to Perrine's Boatworks can meet our master boatbuilder and see sneakboxes and garveys, traditional New Jersey small craft, being built. Family boatbuilding and sneakbox building and restoration classes are available. Through daily demonstrations, educational programs, classes and exhibits, the Jersey Shore Folklife Center celebrates the profoundly creative spirit of the region, its traditional arts, and its occupational and recreational folklife.

Each year, the Commission plans a new season, but also brings back wonderful tradition bearers. Among the annual programs are: *Palaspas* or weaving of the palms, from the Philippines during the Lenten season; *Mick Moloney in Concert*, a National Heritage Designee, whose Irish music is enjoyed around St. Patrick's Day; and *Pysanki* workshop on Ukrainian egg decorating. *The Storytellers Cottage* celebrates cultural traditions through storytelling. The series presents culturally specific narratives that have been passed from generation to generation, that provide a sense of values, community, place, work, or play.

The public is invited to participate in the folk arts through cross-cultural exchange and educational programming.

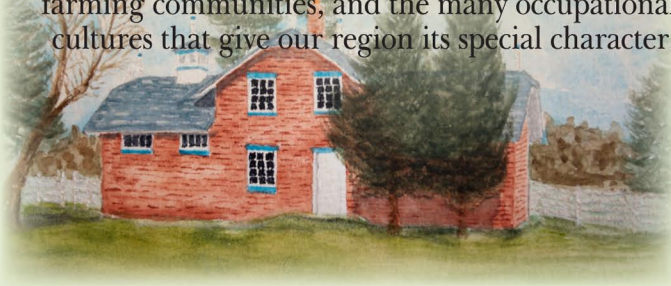
We provide educational guides to the culture presented, with background information, maps, vocabulary and a discussion of the art form. All folklife programs are offered free of charge and open to the public.

Perkins Center for the Arts Folklife Center

The Folklife Center at Perkins Center for the Arts, a community-based nonprofit with facilities in Moorestown and Collingswood, has been identifying and documenting cultural traditions in Burlington, Camden and Gloucester Counties for the past several years. Recent activities include working with African, Afro-Caribbean and African Americans in Willingboro, with artisans in Pemberton, with ethnic communities and artists in Roebing, and with glassblowers in Clayton. In addition, we've spent time exploring the multi-faceted traditions of the Delaware River and its tributary creeks, the historic farming communities, and the many occupational cultures that give our region its special character.

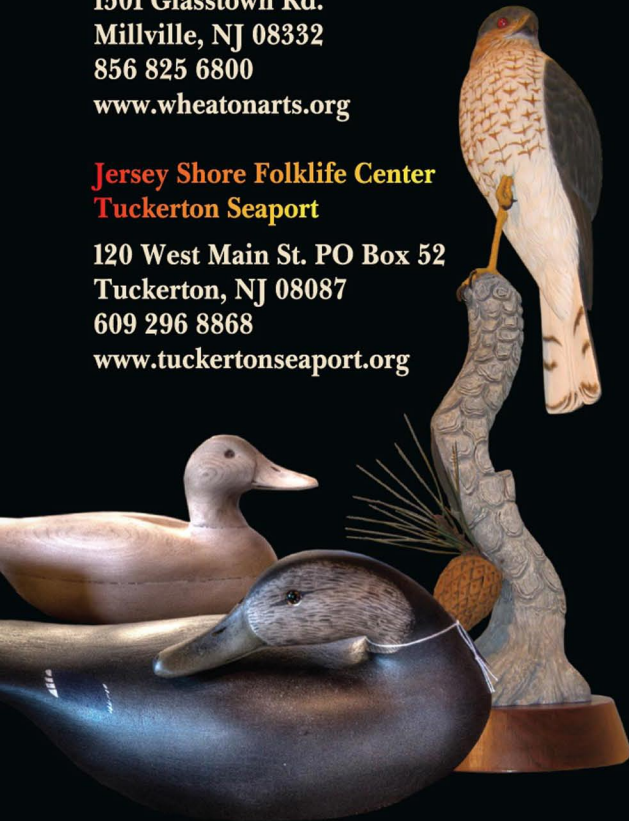
