<sub>1</sub>The performance indicator does not reflect public safety positions, due to outstanding litigation. In December, 144 new lists were issued versus an average of 183 per month for the previous 12 months. Of these lists, 23 (or 16%) were announcements older than six months, resulting in a significant decrease in the backlog of aged job announcements.

<sub>2</sub>Due to a lack of quorum, there has not been a meeting of the Civil Service Commission since October 6, 2010, reducing the number of written record appeals that could be finalized and increasing the number of pending written record appeals. The lack of quorum has also impacted the progress in title elimination and consolidation efforts, since the Civil Service Commission at its meetings must approve the elimination and consolidation of titles in order for the changes to become effective.

<sub>3</sub>The number of State Titles only includes those titles in the Executive branch of State Government. As of December 31, 2010, there are 458 titles assigned to the Judicial and Legislative Branches of State Government that the Civil Service Commission maintains on behalf of both branches; however, the authority over the consolidation and/or elimination of those titles rests with the branches themselves.
