MR. COLE: Not elevated, but there is going to be additional widths. The traffic engineer is here, has looked at the pedestrian traffic and the vehicle traffic.

John, maybe you could address his concerns. MR. KOVAR: I guess one of the issues that came up very early was that of Palisade Avenue with the high school down the road. And that was one issue that was looked at very closely in view of pedestrians and that's why we did some pedestrian counts there and the counts are very high.

Unfortunately, given that an overpass would have to be about 20 feet over the road, the length of the ramp to meet handicap requirements would be somewhere on the order of about 250 feet long. And when you get on the north side of the State Highway, it's very built up. There's a lot of apartments in that area and there's no way to accommodate that kind of ramp. So we did

MR. SINGER: Do you know the approximate square footage of this pedestrian median?

MR, KOVAR: It would be a typical six-foot-wide sidewalk by -- I don't know the length, but it's probably somewhere in the order of about 30, 35 feet long. There's plenty of storage capacity in that area for multiple students or people to cross at the same time.

ACTING CHAIRMAN KAPLOWITZ: I'd like to thank the State for coming, making this presentation to us. It's deeply appreciated. It's a road that certainly needs some repair.

MR. COLE: We know you're right about that and thanks for having us. We appreciate you letting us present to you.

MR. SINGER: I have one more issue and that is the closing of the Arthur Kill landfill over in Staten Island.

MR. KOVAR: Right. What we've done in our plan is right now as you cross Palisade Avenue, pedestrians don't really have a place to stop halfway through. Right now on the eastern side there's impact attenuators covering the sidewalks. And on the west side of the intersection it's just very open. There's a lot of asphalt in there with a crosswalk that goes from end to end. And what we're going to do as part of this project is take away the impact attenuators by realigning the eastbound State Highway to line up with the ramp. We no longer need those impact attenuators. So that sidewalk will now be free. As well as on the western side of the intersection, we're going to create a pedestrian refuge in that area. There will be a curbed area and sidewalk so
