SOME COLLEGE, NO CREDENTIAL: UPDATES ON THE NATIONAL DATA PERSPECTIVE

This session will provide a national update on the Some College, No Credential (SCNC) population as of July 31st, 2021. The National Student Clearinghouse will present information on the growth of SCNC students and provide new information on two subsets of the SCNC population – potential completers, and recent stop-outs. The presentation will also cover how these students re-engaged with postsecondary education by providing how many SCNC students re-enrolled or earned their first credential during the 2021-22 academic year, and how that number changed compared to the previous year. Through the insights into the national metrics, the session aims to help stakeholders start the conversation about how to identify and reengage their own SCNC population.

In this presentation, we will delve into the initial findings from the FY23 NJ SCND Initiative, a transformative effort that supports stopped out learners from 17 institutions in New Jersey. This includes data - both qualitative and quantitative - from stop out learners across the State. We will also address practical steps that institutions can take to provide comprehensive support. By the end of this session, attendees should have a clear understanding of the purpose of the NJ SCND Initiative, possess a deeper understanding of the stopped out learner population in New Jersey, and be equipped with actionable strategies to support these learners effectively.

ADVANCING REENGAGEMENT AND STUDENT SUCCESS THROUGH DATA-INFORMED STRATEGIES FOR THE SOME COLLEGE, NO DEGREE POPULATION

In this session, the Institute for Higher Education Policy (IHEP) will provide an overview and lessons learned from the Degrees When Due (DWD) Initiative, a nationwide degree completion initiative that engaged nearly 200 institutions in 23 states. The initiative sought to promote degree completion and support participating institutions improve their student completion rates by sharing data-driven strategies and tactics, like degree auditing, adult reengagement, and reverse transfer. Through DWD, institutions applied an equity lens to their own real-time student data to ensure that today's students – students of color, low-income students, working students, student parents, and many others – are re-engaged to cross the finish line. DWD helped institutions successfully navigate the technical work of data mining and degree auditing in the course of fundamentally rethinking their campus completion culture, addressing equity gaps, and tackling institutional policies in order to remove barriers that cause adult learners to stop out before completing. This session will focus on strategies and tools for engaging in conversations using disaggregated data to make informed campus decisions and policy and practice change, leveraging examples from DWD institutions.

Jennifer Causey, Senior Research Associate

Jennifer Causey is a Senior Research Associate at the National Student Clearinghouse. She joined the Clearinghouse in March 2020, after spending over six years in Institutional Research at various postsecondary institutions. Since her arrival, she has crafted interactive dashboards for the Research Center's publications, and lead the analysis for the current Some College, No Credential reports released in May 2022 and April 2023. Jennifer earned a M.A. in Developmental Psychology from The City University of New York - Graduate Center, and a B.A. in Psychology from Gettysburg College.
