seven Weeks then got his discharge, was only in one

teen hundred and thirty five of a company of
infantry in the New Jersey establishment,
commanded by Captain Joseph Stout,
attached to the regiment of which William
Maxwell was Colonel, that the aforesaid
Peter Deates was entered by this defendant
into Captain Stout's Company about the
month of September seventeen hundred and
seventy five, for the term of one year; that
the said Deates served ten months in Capt.
